Prize Day is a happy and joyful occasion when we celebrate success, however, since the last time we met many in our school community have faced health, financial and personal challenges, we remember them in our prayers.

Anyone who knows the Academy well understands the vital role the support staff play in maintaining our special ethos. I thank the office, the technical and support staff and record my gratitude to our Financial Administrator - Mrs Neill, my PA - Mrs McCurdy for all their

friendship and support. We continue to remain true to the Academy's central aim - for everyone to be happy at school, known personally and cared for individually. Our special ethos is due to the quality of relationships across our community, and I thank The Academy Association and their Chair, Mrs Audrey Wilson-Reid, for their unstinting support and dedication to the school.

Today I will only be able to provide a brief outline of the academic year. However, I record my thanks to Mrs Gough and her team for compiling a wonderful record of the School Year in our School Magazine, which will be available later in the year on our website. I also encourage you to visit the school website and follow us on Twitter or X, whichever you prefer, to keep up to date with the success of our students.

At the end of the year, we said farewell to Mrs Karen Curran who retired from the Geography Department and Mrs Sally Johnston who retired from the role of my PA. They have both given years of outstanding service to the Academy and we wish them a long and happy retirement. On a personal note, I will

certainly miss Sally's friendship, wisdom and as we say in these parts 'craic'. We also wish Mr Andrew McAuley well in his new career path, as Youth Director with the Association of Baptist Churches in

We welcomed several permanent appointments at the start of term – Miss Amy Galashan (Biology & Science), Mr Johnny Reaney and Mr James McConnell (Geography), Mr Keith McGuinness (Head of Computing & Digital Technology), Miss Abigail Burgess (Spanish & French) and Miss Mary Wright (Senior Clerical Officer). We welcome them to the Academy and trust they enjoy working in our happy community.

Our students excelled in their public examinations, performing significantly better than the NI Grammar School Average. An outstanding 90% of pupils achieving 3 grades A*- C and almost 60% of all entries were A*/A **grades.** Out of the 169 pupils who entered these examinations 69 obtained a minimum of 3 A*/A grades or better, with 21 pupils achieving at least 3 A* grades and 41 pupils obtaining at least 2 A* grades. Two students progressed

to Oxbridge, Lara Crothers – Natural Sciences, Murray Edwards College, Cambridge and Pushti Patel - Medicine, Worcester College, Oxford.

AS Level results were equally impressive, with 96.9% of all students achieving at least 3 AS Levels. These results provide an excellent foundation on which to build for A Level success in 2024.

At GCSE the students achieved the best outcomes in the School's history. All of the Year 12 students achieved at least 5 A*-C grades, including **English and Mathematics, and 99%** of the students achieved at least 7 A*-C grades, including English and Mathematics – truly outstanding results. Almost 70% of all GCSE entries resulted in top grades A*/A and when B grades are included, this figure rises to a phenomenal 91% of all entries.

These are exceptional results and the pupils, parents and teachers of the Academy are to be commended for all of their efforts. We commend the Class of 2023 for their resilience and maturity, we thank them for the wonderful memories they have created in the

Academy and wish them every success in the next stage of their educational iournev.

The education of our young people involves a partnership and I want to pay tribute to my colleagues in our primary schools who have created the foundation for the success our students enjoy. I pay tribute to the dedication and commitment of the teaching and non-teaching staff of the Academy; their professional approach has undoubtedly underpinned this success. I also highlight the ongoing support provided by our parents and the wider community. I ask the pupils to show a token of appreciation to their parents and my colleagues.

with the Confucius Institute at Ulster University. Every year the school receives a fully qualified Mandarin teacher who delivers language and cultural classes to Sixth Form and several of our partner primary schools. It was also our privilege to welcome Madame Zhang, Chinese Consul General, to the school to talk with a number of our senior students about culture, trade and diplomatic career opportunities.

I continued my work as a member of the Independent Review Panel of Education, a commitment by the Northern Ireland Executive in New Decade, New Approach. The Panel published our Interim Report, highlighting the 10 key areas which will be comprehensively reviewed in the final Report.

The wider community continues to support the Academy. We thank the James Kane Foundation for awarding the school a grant, which enabled us to offer bespoke support to disadvantaged students. We also received an extremely generous sum of money, a legacy in the Will of Mr Robert Stephens, which will enable us to provide essential support to the extra and co-curricular life of the school.

The Academy's ethos continues to focus on care and concern for others. Many of our Sixth Form students signed up to newly created volunteering activities, including community support, environmental teams, mental health champions, digital leaders and antibullying ambassadors. The students and my colleagues were also incredibly generous, donating approximately £10,000 to various charities and providing hundreds of shoe boxes for Operation Christmas Child.

We continued to supplement our extensive pastoral curriculum with a range of external speakers and guests, covering many important topics, such as, gambling, alcohol & drugs misuse, online safety and relationship & sexuality education. A range of bespoke 'Skills for Life' development days were also arranged to ensure our students develop the skills to become successful confident young adults who can progress and become contributors to society.

Students continue to participate in the vast array of extra-curricular activities and

House Competitions on offer, as well as travelling on numerous overseas trips. Crozier won the fiercely contested House competition.

Almost 100 students travelled on the annual ski trip to Austria. An extremely successful Physics trip took place to Geneva to visit the United Nations Office, the Red Cross Museum and the world-famous particle accelerator at CERN, the Large Hadron Collider. The History department's biannual trip to Berlin focused on World War II and the Cold War, providing the students with invaluable first-hand learning opportunities.

A multitude of departmental and cocurricular trips and activities also took place. These activities and visits nurtured our students' understanding and provided crucial opportunities to develop key life skills. For example, the Art & Design department visits provided the creative spark that enabled our students to excel - 9 students at GCSE, 4 students at AS and 5 students at A Level obtained full marks in their examinations. A Level Technology student Jack Patterson was runner-up in the senior category of the Sentinus Young Innovators Competition. Following auditions and weeks of rehearsing a group of Sixth Form students participated with considerable prowess in the prestigious Bar Mock Trial competition at the High Court in Belfast.

I thank our Music Department, under the leadership of Mrs Munton and Mrs Qua for the musical items we will enjoy today. We had an amazing 33 offers for the National Youth Choir of Northern Ireland. Emma Kirkwood gained a much sought after place in the Ulster Youth Orchestra. Due to their exceptional musicianship, Molly Spiers and Emma were awarded the prestigious Education Authority Association of Friends Bursary.

Deputy Head Girl, Kiera McQuaid was selected as the Holocaust Educational Trust's Regional Ambassador for Northern Ireland. Kiera, as Chair of our Medical Society, arranged a highly successful Medical Conference as part of our new Shared Education partnership with Abbey Christian Brothers' Grammar School and Our Lady's Grammar School Newry.

We continue to foster an environment of innovation in careers education, embarking on an exciting new partnership with the innovative platform PeopleHawk. This partnership will ensure our students receive valuable training in relation to the core aspects of recruitment today and indeed in the future, including psychometric testing, video interviewing and elevator pitches. We hosted our hugely successful 'Pathways' Careers Fair, where all Year 10 - 14 students were able to engage with more than 65 universities, colleges and public and private sector employers.

Year 10 pupils once again took up the Young Enterprise '10X Challenge'. Over 40 teams from across the year group tested out their entrepreneurial skills and developed essential life skills, as they established micro-businesses on a £10 investment, competing to see who would be most profitable.

The Engineering Society continued to host many former pupils and other industry experts as they inspired the next generation. Year 10 students attended the 3-day Engineering Experience Summer Residential at Queen's University, Belfast – focusing on space, cyber and electrical engineering. Tom Clarke, Year 14, was selected to attend the highly competitive Nuffield STEM programme and spent 2 weeks on research placement at Queen's University, Belfast.

Due to time, I will only briefly outline another amazing year of sporting success for the Academy, with many Ulster and Irish titles secured; alongside over 30 students receiving either National or International Caps across 13 different sports.

In recognition of their talent and achievement at international level, numerous Academy pupils and coaches were shortlisted for the Armagh, Banbridge and Craigavon Junior Sports Awards. Amazingly most of the Awards on the night were awarded to Academy students, teams or coaches. The U14 Girls' Hockey Team won the Junior Team of the Year, the 1st XI Boys' Hockey Team won the Youth School Team of the Year, our Table Tennis coach, Mr Arnold Morgan, won the School Coach of the Year and Emily Reid won the Volunteer Award and Alana Burns-Atkin won the Chairman's Award.

Seven athletes qualified for the Ulster Cross Country Championships, after very impressive performances at the

District Championships. There were no medals at the Ulster Schools' Athletics Championships, however, all the Academy athletes performed exceptionally well, with several personal bests. The future is very bright for our athletes as four longstanding school records were broken during the season.

Laura Comer was selected to represent Ireland at the European Junior Badminton Championships.

Year 12 student, Abbi Harrison, was the youngest member of the Irish Cricket Squad selected for the World Cup in South Africa.

The U15 Boy's Cricket Team reached the semi-final of the U15 Cup and following an epic final the U12 Boys' Cricket Team lifted the Wesley Ferris Cup to be crowned Ulster Champions.

We had the largest ever Dance Team entry in the Northern Ireland Dance competition and in the Ulster Dance and Fitness Championships. The Junior Team won silver medals at both competitions. Rachel Pollock and Lauren Wilson won gold medals at both competitions, whilst Abigail Walker and Sienna Heasley were awarded bronze at the NI and silver at the Ulster competitions. Alexandra Duffy won a silver medal at both competitions for her Junior Solo. Violet Coen, Keisha Moult and Reece Wilson won Gold in the

Intermediate Trio section. Lauren White won gold medals at both competitions, achieving the highest marked Senior Solo. Ruby Bushby and Mia Downey also won gold medals at the NI and Ulster competitions for their Senior Duet.

Year 10 pupils, Emma Stewart and Harry Purdy were selected for the NI Tetrathlon Team and competed at the Royal Windsor Horse Show, after tremendous performances they finished second overall.

Our Golf Team brought home the Darren Clarke Schools' Northern Ireland Golf League Title.

The Boys' 1st XI Hockey Team entered the year as one of the best teams in the history of the Academy. Incredibly there were 15 boys selected for the interprovincial squads and 9 boys for the Irish squad. Having lost the Irish Schools' final on run-ins the previous year the squad demonstrated tremendous resilience and character to win the Tasmanian Shield on run-ins and be crowned All-Ireland Champions. However, the final of the McCullough Cup was delayed to the New Year and unfortunately the boys couldn't quite match the quality of hockey they subsequently lost to RBAI on run-ins. Likewise, they lost their Burney Cup Title

The Boys' 2nd XI, under the expertise of Mr Miskelly, had an outstanding undefeated season. Retaining the Prior Shield and winning the Dowdall Cup – to be crowned double Ulster Champions. The U13 Team made the final of the Bannister Bowl and the U14 Team made the semi-final of the Ferris Cup and the U15 Team made the semi-final of the Richardson Cup.

Head Girl, Pippa Wilson was selected for Ulster U18 Girls' Hockey Team; Alyssa Somerville and Ruby Johnston for the Ulster U16 Team. The 1st XI Girls' Hockey Team had another tremendous season and made it to the semi-final of the Belfast Telegraph Ulster Schools' Cup.

The U14 Girls' Team defeated Wallace High School in the final of the Ulster Schools' Junior Cup – crowned Ulster Champions for the first time since 2013. For the first time ever the U14 Team represented the province at the June Smith All-Ireland competition.

The girls played exceptionally well but narrowly missed winning the Irish Title and came home with the silver medal. An historic season for the girls and with most of the team stepping up to senior hockey the future looks bright for girls' hockey.

Ellie Scott was selected for the U17 Northern Ireland Football Team.

Grace Wills was selected to Captain the

U17 NI Netball Squad in the European Championships and several other pupils were selected for the Netball NI Development Squads. The Junior A, Senior A and Senior B netball teams all made it to the NI Shield Finals Day. The Senior B were crowned NI League Champions. Mrs Nicole Beggs was personally recognised as one of the top three school coaches in NI by her nomination as NI School Coach of the Year.

The school rugby club had the most successful season in the history of the school. Noah Haughey, Arturs Jonuss and Fynn Niblock were selected for the Ulster U17 Rugby Development squads. Connor Magee represented Ulster Schools' U18 & Ireland Schools' U18 and is part of the Irish National Elite training squad. Noah Bell was captain of the Ulster Clubs' & Schools' Team, Ryan Hanna was selected for the Ulster Clubs' & Schools'Team and Andrew Jackson for the Ulster U17 Team.

The 1st XV defeated Lurgan College to win the Gary Clarke Memorial Cup. After very impressive performances in the group stages of the Ulster Schools' Cup the team continued to grow in confidence and defeated Friends' School, Lisburn in the final to be crowned Danske Bank Ulster Schools' Bowl champions.

An historic season for the 1st XV, Mr Leslie and his fellow coaches, as the Schools' Bowl is the highest honour an Academy team has ever attained.

The Medallion squad also excelled and after an epic final the team **shared the Ulster Schools' Medallion Trophy with Enniskillen RGS.**

Emma Stewart, Year 10 and Fergus Lowry, Year 8, took part in the British Shooting Schools' Championships with Emma being placed 1st in the Intermediate competition while Fergus was placed 2nd in the Junior competition.

The Academy swimming teams had an outstanding season, amazingly 11 pupils met the extremely challenging qualifying times to compete at the Ulster Short Course Swimming Championships. Many swimmers also achieved qualifying times for the Irish Short Course Championships in Dublin. At the Ulster Schools' Cup Championships the team won 9 medals and recorded 24 personal best times.

The Junior Girls lifted the Bethany

Firth Cup and the Senior Girls won the Nocher Senior Schools' Cup, both teams creating their own piece of history by winning Ulster Schools' Titles for the first time in the School's history. At the McCullagh International Open Gala in Ireland the teams had further success, recorded 23 personal bests and winning 5 medals.

Zachary Black, Alana Burns-Atkin, and Tara Kennedy were selected to represent the Ulster Interpro Team.

Alana had a truly outstanding season and was selected for the European Junior Championships and the Commonwealth Youth Games in Trinidad and Tobago.

Under the expert coaching of Mr Arnold Morgan the U13 Girls'Table Tennis Team won the bronze medal at the Ulster Schools' Championships. The U15 Girls' Table Tennis Team was crowned Ulster Schools' Champions and went on to claim the silver medal at the All-Ireland Schools' Championships.

Our tennis teams continued to excel – the Minor Girls' reached the Shield final, the Junior Girls' reached the semi-final of the Junior Cup and the Junior Boys' reached the Junior Cup final, with the Intermediate Boys' reaching the NI final, which still has to played in November!

I feel very humble and proud to lead such a talented group of staff who are highly professional and genuinely caring. Their enthusiasm and devotion to our students is the reason why the Academy is such an excellent school. I thank my Vice Principals, Mrs Evans and Mr McFarland, my Senior Leadership Team, the Heads of Department, the entire Pastoral Team, House staff and all of my colleagues for their enthusiasm, support, dedication and friendship.

I thank Mr Livingstone, our Chairman and the members of the Board of Governors for their support and encouragement. I can testify to the dedication of this group of volunteers, and I thank them for their willingness to accept their onerous responsibilities.

Prize Day is a significant event in the life of the School and the organisation of the day is a tribute to the considerable expertise of Mrs Evans and Mrs Morrison. I take this opportunity to thank them on behalf of everyone present for all their efforts in arranging such a special day. A special note of thanks to Mr Cromie for reading the prize winner list and to Mr Brown for his expertise in playing the organ today.

In conclusion, we continue to live in very challenging times with political uncertainty and the cost-of living crisis but please be assured that the Academy will continue to meet the needs of the outstanding young men and women entrusted to our care.

The 2023 Youth Commonwealth Games

I've been swimming for 9 years now and on reflection, I can honestly say that I never thought I'd get to where I am today! I only attended the swimming trials at Banbridge to support my younger sister, but once I discovered my own love for the water, I worked hard to progress through the club. I was swimming quite well and then Covid hit, which put a stop to training in the pool for a while.

Post Covid and again I didn't know what the future held for me in swimming; nevertheless, I worked hard at my fitness with the view of getting back into the pool and back to competitions. Since then, I have had an eventful few years: I became the Irish Open LC Champion in the 200 Butterfly in 2022 and 2023, while I also became the Ulster SC Champion and Irish SC champion in the 200 fly in 2022.

However, it was my participation in the 100 fly that got me the consideration times for the 2023 summer competitions. But like I always seem to do, I did it the hard way, achieving the time in my third attempt in a Time Trial, where there was only one other swimmer with me. Being selected to represent Northern Ireland and Ireland made me very proud and I was looking forward to my first taste of international competitions.

The European Juniors Swimming Competition was held in Belgrade, Serbia, from the 4th to the 9th of July 2023. Twelve swimmers (including me) were set to compete over the six days of competion. This was my first-time representing Ireland, so I was very excited whilst also quite nervous at the same time. I competed in four individual events and one team relay event and achieved two personal bests. Serbia seemed like a nice country with very good food, but I didn't get to see too much as we didn't have a lot of down time.

The 2023 Youth Commonwealth Games, held in Trinidad and Tobago, was a multi-sport event held from the 4th to the 11th of August. Team Northern Ireland competed in a range of events such as swimming, cycling, athletics and triathlon. Five other swimmers and mysel competed over three days. I achieved one personal best, made two finals, and finished fourth and fifth - just missing a medal twice. I was a bit disappointed, but there were a lot of learning outcomes to take away from this experience that I will build on in future competitions. This was such an amazing experience and my first time being outside of Europe. It was very warm, and we did get the opportunity to spend a day at the beach (to enjoy the Caribbean climate) once the days of competition were over. I made many new friends within Team Northern Ireland and beyond, such as Australia and Bermuda. There were ups and downs, but overall, this was truly a once in a lifetime experience that I will remember forever.



























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F.E. McWilliam Visit

Last hosted in 2018, this major event saw over 60 exhibitors from a range of universities, colleges, employers and other organisations set up camp in the Assembly Hall and Sports Hall. Pupils from Year 10 and above were invited to visit the exhibition, talk with exhibitors, gather an armload of merchandise and hopefully come away equipped with information which would help shape their future careers. The school owes a great debt of gratitude to all who attended, especially to local businesses and members of our area learning community. The event was part of a twoday programme with Methodist College, Belfast and we were delighted to once again work with colleagues there. Look out for the next 'Pathways' in 2024.

September to Christmas is the time of year when we focus our attention on Year 14 pupils and a range of activities took place to help prepare them for their next step. Pupils participated in an interview skills event in October when we were delighted to welcome representatives from companies as diverse as Danske Bank, PwC, Kane Group and Visa to give pupils a sense of what it is like to sit in the hot-seat. In addition, we were very grateful to medical staff and teachers from the wider community for giving up their time to assist in mock interviews for medicine, dentistry and teaching programmes.

Year 13 began their year by thinking about the employability skills outlined in the Department of the Economy's Skills Barometer. Their learning was put to the test when they embarked on work experience in February and had a further opportunity to participate in mock interviews in June. Year 13 pupils also had the opportunity to visit the UCAS Discovery Exhibition at the Eikon Centre, Sprucefield in March. This annual event is always a great chance for young people to interact with representatives from a huge range of universities and get a better understanding of their options.

We continued to work with Young Enterprise this year, drawing on the organisation's excellent range of programmes to support pupils in Year 8, Year 10, Year 12 and Sixth Form. The 10X Challenge is a regular highlight in the calendar, and it was great to see Year 10 flex their entrepreneurial muscles as


Guiltily, the warriorashamed by the actions of his comrades- crept into the towering trees. He cast a final glance into the Beast's eyes. Here

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Government and Politics Review

The Government and Politics hosted and took part in a number of interesting and educational experiences during the last academic year.

On October 4th Year 13 students attended the COP 27 Simulation Negotiation event in Belfast City Hall, organised by the British Council. The 4 students represented the interests of Bangladesh and the USA and they took part in live discussions with representatives from London and Egypt where strategies to reduce CO2 emissions, to reduce the temperature of the earth and each country's respective action plans were discussed.

In November Year 13 students participated in the Learn with the Lords programme, where we had an online meeting with the Labour peer, Lord Hunt of Kings Heath. We had a very informative afternoon where Lord Hunt answered questions on the role of the House of Lords, his nomination and work as a life peer and the prospects for future reform of the Lords. This was immensely beneficial to our AS studies.

February saw us again work with the Learn with the Lords programme and we welcomed Viscount Brookeborough to Banbridge Academy. Viscount Brookeborough spoke to Year 13 and 14 pupils studying Government and Politics. Viscount Brookeborough is one of 92 hereditary peers in the House of Lords, he is also a member of the Royal Household as a Personal Lord in Waiting to the Monarch as well as serving as the Lord Lieutenant of Fermanagh, where he also presides over the family ancestral home of Colebrook Estate. Viscount Brookeborough delivered a very interesting presentation on the House of Lords which was both informative and useful to the Politics students present. He then participated in a question and answer session with the students where he was willing to talk about all aspects of his work, including life in the House of Lords, his work as both an hereditary peer and a crossbencher, the reform of the House of Lords and his experience as a Personal Lord in Waiting. The pupils thoroughly enjoyed the visit as it gave them a real insight into the House of Lords. They were fascinated by Viscount Brookeborough's stories and anecdotes and the range of people he has met



through his work. We really appreciated Viscount Brookeborough's willingness to give of his time to the students.

The final event of the year was a follow up to the Good Summit event which Politics students attended in Dublin last year. The Rev Harold Good OBE visited to share his experience of peace building in Northern Ireland. We were joined by Politics students from Our Lady's Grammar and the Abbey CBS and the Rev Harold Good told his story of US civil rights, the NI peace process, the decommissioning of IRA and ETA weapons and a lifetime of work facilitating difficult conversations. Pupils availed of the opportunity to ask questions and appreciated the Rev Good's honesty and openness.

These events help to add depth and understanding to the syllabus and they bring the study of Politics to life.



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Parallel Histories Conference: Parliament buildings, Stormont



Parallel Histories' aim is to encourage students to study disputed history by looking at relevant and controversial situations in history which have competing narratives, studying both sides of the argument closely using provided sources and forming coherent arguments to support both sides, ultimately allowing students to form their own judgements. Through partaking in debates, students are challenged to consider multiple interpretations of evidence and different points of view, and this is a skill which is very useful in the study of history, as well as important in healthy democracies.

In September a group of ten Year 13 and Year 14 History students along with Mr Erskine, were invited to take part in a national conference at Stormont to debate controversial topics in History. Schools from across the island of Ireland, England, Scotland and from Europe were in attendance to discuss and debate the lasting legacy of conflict in Northern Ireland and Israel-Palestine.

Students displayed a myriad of skills in source analysis, reasoning, understanding bias and interpretation as well as being able to formulate arguments and counter arguments. They were able to competently construct and

deliver debates on controversial topics from multiple perspectives.

Students were guided by teachers and facilitators in the research methods and provided with individual feedback on their oral contributions.

The Banbridge Academy students were given much praise by the facilitators for their ability to think on their feet and adapt a line of questioning accordingly.

The following day would see the French pupils heading off on their day trips and visits included: the Titanic Museum and tour of Belfast City, the Giant's Causeway and Carrick-a-Rede and a trip to the Ulster Folk and Transport museum. On Wednesday, the pupils spent a day in school with us, enjoying an Art class with Miss McCullough, cookery lesson with Miss Jess, and they even got to try on the Academy uniform before going on a tour of the school and having lunch in the canteen. On Tuesday evening we all enjoyed a Social evening here in school and at the weekend took our partners to laser tag, the cinema, karting, football matches and much more.



Before we knew it, the week was over and we brought our partners back to school for a 4am departure, knowing that in about 8 weeks time it would be our turn to have a fun-packed week and meet up with our partners again.

We all kept contact with our pen pals whether it was via phone calls, or texts and we sent them many photos from their visit here. It seemed like no time until we were ready to set off to France ourselves. Although the nerves were beginning to kick in, we packed our bags, ready to leave from school at 3am on Friday 23rd June. The morning passed quickly and we landed in Lyon around 10am, before driving three hours to Dijon. We were so excited to see our partners again and they even held a drinks reception for us at school, each of them having prepared some typical French snacks and treats for us.

My pen pal lived in a 3 storey house about a 5 minute drive from school and only a 30 second walk from the local pool. She had two older brothers and they (along with her parents) were so welcoming. That evening I had my first traditional French meal and during the weekend, my host family took me hiking in the Swiss Alps, an experience I will never forget! Indeed, everyone had a fantastic



weekend with their host families, some going to Paris to explore the sites, others visiting the local attractions in Dijon, one pupil even having the chance to attend a baptism.

During the week, the school had organised so many day trips for us. These included a trip to the Citadelle of Besançon, where we had an audio tour of the city and its construction as well as a visit of the zoo. We went to the Cassisium where we sampled cassis syrups and had a guided tour of the factory, the Hospices of Beaune and the Alix BD comic museum.

On the Wednesday evening, the French pupils had organised a party for everyone, similar to the one we had organised, with food, music and dancing. It was great to do something fun with everyone on one of the last nights in France.

On Thursday we spent the morning in



school with our pen pals and played lots of team games related to the European Union and areas such as languages, geography and currencies. Afterwards, we had lunch in the canteen, then in the afternoon went to Dijon city to buy some last minute presents for everyone back home. Dijon is such a beautiful city, lined with cobbled streets, fantastic shops, coffee bars and restaurants and many squares where people like to relax around the fountains, enjoying a cold drink in the sun.

Unfortunately, on Friday morning, we had to say goodbye to our exchange partners after a week of amazing experiences with our host families. Many tears were shed amongst the group, which shows that special memories and indeed friendships were made.

We think that the French Exchange is a unique trip, one which encourages you to step outside of your comfort zone and seek out new experiences whilst making



new friends. It is a fantastic opportunity to improve your spoken French and it certainly is a great stepping stone for those pupils who would like to continue studying French at GCSE level.

Kiera McQuaid a Northern Ireland Regional Ambassador for the Holocaust Educational Trust

My journey with the Holocaust Educational Trust began in March 2021, when I had the opportunity to engage with their flagship 'Lessons from Auschwitz Programme' for Sixth Form students through the Religious Studies department. I was keen to participate as I knew other students from the Academy had taken part and found it a worthwhile opportunity. This programme consisted of three live sessions - one on Pre-War Jewish life, another where we heard the testimony of a Holocaust survivor and a final session to reflect on what we had learnt and how we were going to share

This part of the programme is called 'Next Steps' project and is a key tenet of the Trust's philosophy on Holocaust Education as it is important to share what you've learnt with your community, as survivors become frailer and less able to share their testimony. This concept is perhaps best illustrated by the words of Elie Wiesel who wrote, "When you listen to a witness, you become a witness."



We were all given a copy of Elie Wiesel's memoir, 'Night' to help us gain insights into survivors' experiences and I later learnt more about his writings at AmCon 2023. Ordinarily, the programme would also include a visit to Auschwitz-Birkenau but due to COVID-19 restrictions, this was unable to take place. However,

the virtual tour which was organised showed us the key sites in the camp like the huts, cattle trailers and the infamous 'Arbeit Macht Frei' gate.

The survivor centred programme, which the Holocaust Educational Trust provides, allowed the educator's

teaching on pre-war Jewish life to complement and enhance our understanding of the political and social background to survivors, like Eve's story. Eve Kugler was seven years old when Kristallnacht took place, and her story of survival, and that of her family's, is incredible. Her parents survived three concentration camps, and Eve and her older sister were sent to America after living in a series of foster homes. Her younger sister, Lea was hidden first in a Catholic convent and then an isolated farm - they were all reunited in New York in 1946. Eve's advice to get to know others outside of your usual social circle to prevent prejudice has stuck with me since hearing her testimony.

During the final session, we also heard from a Rabbi and took part in a candle lighting ceremony where I also read a poem called 'The Shtetl' written by an anonymous author. Shtetl is a Yiddish word, typically used to denote a small town with a majority Jewish population. Such communities existed across eastern Europe in the pre-war era; all were destroyed in the Holocaust.

For my Next Steps Project, I took a Religious Studies lesson for a group of second year students, focusing on the impact of prejudice and discrimination and antisemitism through history. I also shared Eve Kugler's story with them.

Lattended AmCon 2022 online and heard more about contemporary antisemitism and the relevance of the Trust's work today, which I found interesting and engaging. When the opportunity to apply to be a Regional Ambassador arose, I knew it was the next step up in my iourney with the Trust and would enable me to raise awareness of the Holocaust and its contemporary relevance on an even greater scale. I was delighted to be selected as a Regional Ambassador for Northern Ireland in March.

On 22nd March 2023, I attended the first Regional Ambassador training day in London where I met many other young people from across the UK who were also passionate about raising awareness of the Holocaust and its relevance. At this event we heard from a Regional Ambassador alumnus who told us about projects he had organised, gave them some advice for running their own projects and shared stories of the experiences he had had with the Trust.

The most poignant part of the day was hearing from Vera Schaufeld MBE, who came to Britain on the Kindertransport. Her experiences of feeling 'othered' by her teacher before leaving and her difficulties, like an initial language barrier, are just as relevant in our treatment of refugees and other displaced people today. Most importantly, Vera's inspiring story was one of hope and courage, because she went on to be a teacher after leaving school and specialised in teaching other teachers how to help child refugees settle in to school. She emphasised the importance of education for children but said that it wasn't enough to teach young people history, we must teach empathy and understanding. I strongly believe that hearing Vera's testimony will stay with

I then attended AmCon 2023 as a Regional Ambassador in person. I met the Chief Rabbi who underlined the importance of Holocaust remembrance, heard from a member of the Second Generation (Michelle Richman, daughter of Zigi Shipper) and heard from many interesting academics such as Philip Spencer who discussed genocide and anti-semitism and Robert Eagle who considered Holocaust literature. I also had the opportunity to take part in workshops around Britain's response to the refugees created by the Holocaust and planning Holocaust Memorial Day commemorations.

This year, the theme for Holocaust Memorial Day is the Fragility of Freedom. This centres around the idea that the freedoms we take for granted each day are simply a few steps from being taken away from us. In terms of the Jewish experience during the Holocaust, the Nazis did not simply send six million Jews to extermination camps to be murdered overnight - Jewish people had their freedoms eroded over years by the Nazis and it's important to recognise that. Another key part of the Holocaust Educational Trust's Programme is the recognition of contemporary relevance of what you learn; my own Next Steps Project focused on the experiences of Uighur Muslims in China. I hope that this year, when commemorating Holocaust Memorial Day, people can focus and reflect on this.

Trip to QUB Pharmacy

Banbridge Academy Triple Award Science pupils got the chance to visit Queen's University Belfast, School of Pharmacy on June 9th 2023 to learn about how medicines and tablets are developed, tested, and analysed, to make sure they are suitable for sales and consumption.

We were given a taste of the 'QUB' lifestyle when we had a university style lecture to display the daily life of a pharmacy student, while also being presented with some of the career choices available to the future generation of 'medicine makers' to assist them with making the choice of which courses they want to do.

The pupils felt very intelligent when we used our triple award course on 'Chromatography', taught by the wonderful Banbridge Academy Chemistry department, to experiment on medicine solutions to find the mystery solution using polar solvents with polar solutions, giving us insight for the topics to come throughout next year's chemistry lessons.

We got to see first-hand how tablets were created, by machine and manually, while also testing them on how they travel and dissolve in our stomachs. The enlightening fact that no medicines or tablets could be distributed unless they are in the 99.9 percentile, gave everyone a sense of ease to ensure that everything is certainly double if not triple checked before it arrives in our hands.

Overall, every pupil enjoyed the very hands-on, informative and interactive day out which showed the many different

sectors there are in the pharmacy field. It was a really eye-opening experience, which showcased the multiple sectors to pharmacy while still displaying how enjoyable it is. It also showed how important chemistry is to the world and how it works.

I guess we might need to remember GCSE chemistry for a while then!









Geneva Trip



On our first day, we visited the United Nations Offices in Geneva and got a guided tour. The UN is an international organisation made up of 193 countries, which work together to find solutions for current issues such as: human rights, health, climate change and violence. People from different countries meet together in the large conference rooms to discuss these topics to try and come to a shared solution. Each conference room is funded by a different country, from which the room is then inspired the Oatar conference room is inspired by the country's desert sand dunes and Qatari traditions and culture. There is enough seating for each country's representatives, translators and media personnel. The libraries and offices at the UN are for research by UN staff and members, but can also be used by students and the general public to learn about international communities. The buildings are full of artwork representing different ideas and progress in human rights, created by people from different ages, backgrounds and cultures, from artwork made of nails representing darkness into light, to drawings by children representing the Universal Declaration of Human Rights.

On the morning of the third day of the Geneva trip, we visited the Red Cross Museum, situated beside the United Nations. The museum consisted of three

separate exhibitions, the first being named 'Defending Human Dignity' which showcased excerpts of the 1864 Geneva Convention and a sculpture of Henry Dunant, a co-founder of the Red Cross movement. Also in the exhibition is the 'Chamber of Witnesses', which showcased testimonies from real witnesses who were affected by war. The next exhibition called 'Restoring Family Links' showed how the Red Cross works to help families reunite after wars and natural disasters. The exhibition showcased a memorial tower with portraits of Rwandan children after the country's 1994 genocide and commemorates the missing people of the 1995 Srebrenica massacre. It also showcased reproductions of the archives of the International Prisoners of War Agency, founded by the Red Cross, from 1914-1923.

The final exhibition called, 'Reducing Natural Risks' included videos and even an interactive game showing how to prepare for natural disasters and what the Red Cross does in the aftermath of natural disasters. Overall, the Red Cross museum aims at showing how the humanitarian action provided by the Red Cross has helped people of all ethnicities and backgrounds and benefited those affected by various events such as famines, wars, natural disasters, and genocides. The Red Cross Museum was very informative and not only highlighted the difficulties of humanitarian action, but also highlighted the impact that people can have in helping those to overcome these tragedies.

CERN is the European Council for Nuclear Research, home to the Large Hadron Collider (LHC) which is the world's largest and most powerful particle accelerator located 100 metres underground and it is 27 kilometres in length, running through both Switzerland and France. The LHC is best known for its discovery of the Higgs boson particle back in 2012. Before we started our tour, we watched a video on the history of CERN. It was officially founded in September 1954 by 12 different European countries. The first place we saw on our tour was the antimatter factory, where we got to take a look at the antiproton decelerator that produces low energy antiprotons by decelerating and cooling a beam of antiprotons until they are travelling at a tenth of the speed of light. They are then subjected to another deceleration ring known as ELENA (Extra Low Energy Antiproton), which reduces their energy again by a factor of 50. The antimatter made is then used in several different experiments that involve studying antimatter and its properties.

Next we saw the CERN Data Centre, which

has a massive room in it that is filled with computers used to store and send data from the experiments conducted at CERN. In the Data Centre we learnt about how the World Wide Web was invented at CERN back in 1989 by Tim Berners-Lee and how he created the first website, which was about the world wide web project. CERN was my favourite part of the trip as I really enjoyed learning about the history of CERN and about all the experiments they conduct.

Work Experience at **Atkins Global**

When someone says "Work Experience" what comes to mind? Something you can put on your CV? An insight into your future career? A chance to learn something new? Or do you think it's just like working, but instead of being paid in cash you get paid with experience? Whatever your thoughts on "Work Experience" may be, here's how my placement at Atkins played out for me. For those of you who have never heard of the company,. Atkins Global is a "World-leading design, engineering and project-management consultancy" and I applied for a work experience placement with them in hope of learning more about what engineering at Atkins entails.

Since Atkins is situated in Belfast, Monday June 9th started off with unnecessary worry as I feared the thought of getting lost and being late on the first day. However, Atkins in Belfast is conveniently stationed right in front of the Europa Bus Centre, and to the right of Starbucks. Inside a building called, "The Vantage", situated on the 5th floor is where the Atkins office can be found. For the first day, I was in fact early and I had the opportunity to get to know the receptionist. While waiting for the other work experience students to arrive, she gave me a general overview of what she does as a receptionist at Atkins and this helped calm a few nerves. When the other work experience students arrived, I was pleasantly surprised to see a few familiar faces. With all of us now present, we were led to a cosy, little, modern meeting room and this is where we mostly stayed for the entirety of our placement: from 9:30am to 3pm, Monday to Friday, that meeting room was ours.

Monday morning consisted of a tour of the building and the rest of the week consisted of multiple sessions that included talks, site visits, and group activities. I will be highlighting what I thought were the most memorable and invaluable sessions.

On Monday we had the "What is Civil

Engineering?" talk by Aoife Campbell, who was also the woman responsible for organising our placements, as well as looking after us during our stay. This was followed up by two more talks from other employees at Atkins. After lunch, we talked about CVs and their importance and we then had to fill in a simple form that mimicked a CV. With their assistance, we wrote down our school subjects, our interests, hobbies, achievements, skills, and qualities and we had to explain how those would contribute to our future choice of career. This activity encouraged us to think and ask questions. Fun fact, Maeve Glover a Senior Consultant at Atkins states that, "Gaming is something you can put down as a hobby or interest, because it displays your team working skills, as well as your communication skills" which I thought was interesting. Again, after that talk, we had another two talks to finish the day. My first impressions of Atkins were a mix of relief that the first day was over, mingled with excitement for what would come the following day.

Tuesday was an eventful day. We had a talk on Electrical Engineering by Declan McLaughlin and he informed us of his work in the Water and Wastewater Industry. He's currently part of a £123 million project; the project is the upgrade works on Beckton STW. He's the only electrical engineer at Atkins, so he works with other people from a variety of other locations and because of Atkins' flexibility, he often just works at home on days he can't come into the office. It's not just Atkins that lack electrical engineers, many other companies are struggling to get electrical engineers because of the increasing demand for them. Statistics say that electrical engineers will be in high demand for the next decade. So, for those of you working to become an electrical engineer, keep at it!

We also had an Ecology talk by a very enthusiastic Atkins employee, Annoushka Bayat, who in fact didn't think she would end up with a career in Ecology. The reason for this was that she didn't get the grades she needed for a different course she was planning to do and ended up studying ecology instead. From there, she absolutely fell in love with it. Following that we had a Landscape Architect, Naomh Turbett, talk and give us a tour around Belfast. She showed the variety of projects she worked on in the city and not all of them went according to plan. For example, the metal spikes that you see lined up across the side of the road in front of Belfast City Hall labelled, Titanic, Olympic, Oceanic, Britannic, Laurentic, Celtic, Nomadic and Traffic. Those were originally supposed to oxidise into the same green colour as the roofs of Belfast City Hall. However, that did not happen due to the company responsible for the preparation of the materials messing up. After that we ended that with a new skill, since we spent the 2 hours learning the basics of AutoCAD, by making simple shapes using commands.

Wednesday was the exciting site visit day. However, that was set to be after lunch. So, before lunch we had a "Bridge Engineering Presentation" by Eoghan McManus, followed by a group activity. With the group activity, we basically got to play with magnets. After being split into two groups, my group was challenged with the task of working together and making a structurally sound bridge; using the knowledge we had learnt from the previous talk on bridges, and by following the instructions. Once we finished the bridge, we shook the surface the bridge was stationed on, to test its structural strength. Safe to say it survived the horrendous, 3.0 magnitude earthquake we brought upon it. What came next, was the talk on Geotechnical Engineering by Shane Gribbin, followed by lunch, then the site visit. For the site visit we needed steel capped boots, helmets, and high vis vests, since we were visiting a construction site to learn about the "Belfast Flood Alleviation Scheme". Lesley Cooper, an apprentice working for Lagan Construction Group (a company working alongside Atkins for this project) gave us some details about

what they were doing and why. As you may or may not know, Belfast suffered a flooding back in 2008 and Belfast is predicted to experience another flood, so to combat this, this scheme basically allows the construction of walls around The River Lagan to prevent the flood from seriously damaging and ruining the surrounding area.

Thursday was a busy day with 9 different talks. The first talk of the day was "Building Surveying" by Conall McMurray. What followed was not a talk, but another activity. Monica McNally, another employee at Atkins, was supposed to teach us the basics of Civil 3D, however there was a problem with getting them loaded on our computers, so instead of designing a junction on Civil 3D we designed one on AutoCAD and we were able to learn a few more AutoCAD skills. Next was a Social Value talk by Brendan Gallagher, where he explained the planning and reasoning behind the design and location of the new Belfast bus station (that's currently in the works). The location of the new bus station is right behind the Europa, so on your way to and from the new

bus station people are going to be encouraged to interact with the very accessible shops granted to them, since Great Victoria Street is lined with a variety of stores and businesses. The busy morning was followed by an even busier afternoon. After lunch, we had 3 separate talks for engineering: Aerospace, Tunnel, and Nuclear. To end the day, we were supposed to have informative talks on "Apprenticeships" by Omae Al Haj Kadour, "Placements" by Luke Gallagher and "Graduate Schemes" by Anisa McConnell, each talk scheduled to be a maximum of 10 minutes long. However, Omar, the employee giving the apprenticeship talk, started getting really passionate about his talk and ended up talking for the whole 30 minutes. Regardless, getting to hear about apprenticeships, especially from an apprentice, was really worthwhile and informative.

Before I knew it, Friday had arrived and the schedule for that day was pretty laid back and calm. The first session was a talk about "Process Engineering" by Laura Lyttle, followed by another AutoCAD lesson. This time we learnt how to make

I found my time at Atkins Global very beneficial and I enjoyed the variety of experiences and knowledge I gained during my time there. You must acknowledge that not all companies you decide to do work experience with will work the same way as how another company may do it. However, I highly suggest taking up work experience whenever you can. If you're interested in engineering, but unsure of the type of engineering you want to get into, Atkins Global is the perfect place to do work experience, as they talk about a VARIETY of other types of engineering and the opportunities open to those.

Then to end the day, and what was ultimately the end of my work experience placement, we had a 2 hour talk on "Drainage Engineering" by Ashleigh Leigh. 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Engineering Experience

On 25th July 2023, a small number of Year 10 students from Banbridge Academy attended the 3 day Engineering Experience Summer Residential at Queen's University Belfast organised by The Smallpiece Trust.

This 3 day programme offered students the opportunity to get handson experience with STEM projects focusing on space, cyber and electrical engineering. 50 students from schools all over Northern Ireland participated in the programme and students stayed in the halls of residence throughout the

On day one, we were arranged in groups and were provided with a number of activities based on cyber engineering. Firstly, we had to decode a secret message based on levels of difficulty. Then we moved onto more complicated and advanced coding. After we had completed all the challenges, we then got a package that had radio equipment inside but was locked. We had to unlock the bag using all the different techniques we had completed earlier in the session. After unlocking the radio, we were provided with lunch, which we ate in our groups and spent time getting to know the other students. Later that day each group was given a lego robot. We had to code it to move in different directions, move and stop at different colours and manoeuvre around different obstacles. The staff had arranged a programme of activities that evening for us to engage in, and we had dinner and had planned to do sports outside, however the weather had affected these plans so we watched a movie and played some games instead.

On day two we engaged in some tasks based around electrical engineering. Each group had to design and create a radio, using the parts we unlocked the previous day and we had to 'buy' certain materials to create the outside of the radio to make it look attractive. We had to make the radio affordable enough so that people would want to buy it, this



meant that we shouldn't spend too much so that people would buy your product. Firstly, we were required to solder all the parts of our radio onto the circuit board in order to connect them together. Then we needed to measure and cut out the pieces to make the shape of our design and hot glue it all together. After lunch, each group was given an ipad to create an advertisement for our radio. The radio and the advertisement would be presented in a showcase the following day. That evening we had dinner, and due to typical Northern Irish summer weather we didn't get to do sports outside, but spent the evening playing some more games.

At the beginning of day three we had to make sure the radios and advertisements were complete and the final touches were done. Before the showcase began, a member of the Thales Group came in and talked to us about engineering and the different job opportunities we could explore. Then each group displayed their radio and advertisement as some members of each group walked around seeing all of the different radios we had designed.. Once everybody had seen each radio, we each voted for the best team. The team who had designed the best product were given a prize of a mini bluetooth speaker, and this meant the end of our Engineering experience.

This was a really worthwhile experience as we were able to find out about lots of different careers in engineering as well as getting hands-on experience with lots of different equipment. It was also nice to spend time getting to know pupils from other schools. Overall, a really enjoyable

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





Our audition consisted of an argumentative speech on a current topic, debating the pros and cons in front of our esteemed Judge Miss McClelland, her advisors (Barristers Severina Kelly and Vikki Singer) and her mighty gavel!! They selected the pupils they believed were best able to embrace the roles of barrister, witness, court clerk, usher and

Practices began at lightning speed, and we were given out roles that we had to embody: a bouncer, a policeman and a nosy neighbour among other roles. Once familiar with the cases, our determined barristers (Abigail Noke, Lauren White, Lara Crothers and Mia Downey) took to the task with ease, preparing their speeches and questions for the witnesses (Nicole McCully, Maeve Magowan, Rose Widdis, Emily Reid, Aaron Millen, Aimee Dawson, Moore McLoughlin and Abi Dreaning) and questions that they would put to the witnesses from the other schools. Whilst our court clerk and usher, Kaitlyn Jess and Julia Herron, began to rehearse their actions and lines.

Everything had to be kept to a tight time limit, which was hard for a lot of us given how much we love to talk, but nevertheless we prevailed. 

Wellbeing Ambassadors

2022-23 was another busy year for the BA Wellbeing Ambassadors, providing daily support for their peers every breaktime in The Quiet Room; leading Anti-Bullying assemblies and attending further training courses, including completing The Link Life Suicide Prevention Training facilitated by the EA Youth Service. Additionally they conducted a piece of action research to establish the current wellbeing needs of the pupils, in order to facilitate the school to provide informed practice to address these needs. They did this by designing an online survey to provide an insight on pupils' perception of their own mental health, their awareness of support services and how they felt school could help them in maintaining good emotional health and

525 pupils from all year groups completed the survey and it was encouraging to see 83% of pupils rated their mental health as a 3 or above on a scale where 1 ='not great' and 5= 'amazing'; 83% of pupils rated their confidence in coping with their own mental health between 3-5, where 1= not very confident and 5+ =very confident.

The survey also included the WHO-5, a

Five point self report Wellbeing Index. used by the World Health Organisation to measure current mental wellbeing. This scale had been used in previous Wellbeing Surveys in school, so it was interesting to compare results over the years and note that while scores had dipped during Covid in 2020, they seem

to be returning in a positive direction

towards pre Covid levels.

As the table indicates, The WHO- 5 results indicated that the majority of pupils reported very good well-being, however only 48% of pupils reported waking up feeling fresh and awake. Findings of the report have resulted in Sleep hygiene becoming a focus in the PD programme, Form Class resources, and guidance being placed on the school website

under Pupil Wellbeing.

Key issues that pupils said negatively affected their mental health included: exam stress, homework, schoolwork, friendship issues, home life, and balancing school work with other commitments. The most positive influences on their mental health included: friends, family, home life, extracurricular activities, exercise and

In response to some of these points, the effective use of homework is the focus for the Teaching and Learning committee for 2023-24. We have increased awareness about the various ways to access the school counselling services, peer support is available daily, and we continue to engage with numerous outside agencies to provide workshops and assemblies.

70% of pupils reported knowing about outside organisations, where they can get help with mental health issues. The Wellbeing Ambassadors also endeavour to increase this awareness through additional resources for Form Classes, directing pupils to the links on our school website and further advertisement of agencies available throughout the school.

Banbridge Academy 1st XV have booked their place in the Final of the Danske Bank Schools' Bowl with a hard-fought 37-21 win over Omagh Academy in a pulsating semi-final. Andrew Jackson opened the scoring for the Academy with a penalty after just 3 minutes, but despite further pressure from Banbridge it was Omagh who scored first with a well worked forward based try and successful conversion. This sparked the Academy into life as they responded 5 minutes later when 2nd Row Tom King powered over and Jackson successfully converted. This was followed up 5 minutes later The 2nd half got off to a great start when Scrum-half Harry Wan finished off a brilliant attack from the Academy, but just when it seemed the Banbridge boys would pull away, Omagh mounted a counter attack to score on 50 minutes and when the kick was converted they took a 20-21 lead into the final quarter. But Banbridge had saved their best for last. After a number of strong drives, Hooker Connor Magee powered his way over the line to score and Jackson once again added the extras, then a few minutes later Jackson slotted a longrange penalty to take the game out to 9 points. With time running out Banbridge kicked a penalty into the corner and Prop Jonathan McCrum scored his second of the day from the resulting powerful driving maul to seal the 37-21 victory.

Final v Friends' School

Banbridge Academy 1st XV achieved their own little bit of history on, Wed 8th March by winning the Schools Bowl for the first time. The Academy overcame Friends' School, Lisburn 31-15 to claim the Ulster title on a cold but dry day at a blustery Barban Hill, home of Dromore Rugby Club. A huge crowd, in excess

The Forwards

The other second row was L6 Jack Shaw, who was a fast developing forward who enjoys carrying the ball and always gives 100% on the

Flanker Adam Logan forced his way into the team at the end of the season with outstanding performances for both the 2nd XV and 1st XVs and broke into the starting team for the Cup run. Adam is a workhorse flanker who runs and tackles for the full 70 minutes. U6 Henry Knox also played numerous games at flanker and was always industrious and hardworking in both defence and attack.

The Backs

Scrum-half is L6 Fergus Alway. Fergus has a strong pass off both hands and is an excellent decision maker at half back. L6 Harry Wan also played a number of times. Harry is a talented player who is happy playing either 9 or 10 and always does a great job whenever needed. He was awarded the Clubman of the Year award. At Outhalf yr 12 Andrew Jackson slotted seamlessly into the team. He is very effective at running his back line and has an eye for a gap himself, allied with a very strong kicking game. At first Centre was L6 Daniel Hutchinson; Daniel is equally at home at outhalf and is a superb ball player who runs great lines of 10. Outside centre was L6 Luke Charman who is a hard running and big hitting player but also has a subtle side to his ever improving game. On one wing was U6 Noah Myles who possessed incredible pace and strength and was an attacking threat from all areas of the field. On the

other wing was L6 Darragh Knox, whose excellent footwork was always a threat to opposition defence. At fullback was Captain U6 Ryan Matthews. Ryan has an excellent kicking game and was also rock solid under the highball, as well as being very keen to turn defence into attack. He led the team excellently throughout the season and was a first-rate captain. U6 Ronan Quinn would have been a regular starter for the team but unfortunately a bad injury early in the season put him out for the year, but his footwork and defensive capabilities were greatly missed. L6 Jacques Macauley played a number of games at centre or wing and his pace and eye for a gap were always a worry for opposition defences. Yr 12 Elijah Dempsey could also play in wing or centre and he too has pace to burn and came up with some crucial scores as the season progressed.

The EMTEK sponsored, Banbridge Academy Boys' Hockey 1st XI, travelled to Cork in October to take part in the All Ireland Schoolboy Championship. This prestigious tournament takes part over 3 days, the gruelling competition schedule demands extreme levels of fitness, with the potential for 5 games in just 72 hours. The top 16 teams from the island of Ireland are split into 4 groups, with just the top team from each group qualifying for the semi-finals.

Banbridge Academy's group included Middleton College (Munster), Sullivan Upper (Ulster) and Wesley College (Leinster). The first group game saw them face Middleton College at Middleton's home pitch. Despite vocal home support for Middleton, Banbridge started the game on the front foot, with an energetic press forcing their opposition to make mistakes and give opportunities for the pacey forwards to capitalise. A high defensive line ensured any Middleton threats were dealt with swiftly, often leading to instant counter attacks. On day 2 the Academy played Ulster rivals Sullivan Upper. Sullivan were very

Wallace were highly organised in their defence, which caused the usual free flowing attacks of Banbridge Academy to stumble. Despite lots of possession Banbridge were rushing their opportunities and getting frustrated by the excellent discipline of the Wallace defensive line. Wallace were also quick to counter, with pace and skill upfront. On a quick attack Wallace caught the Academy defence off guard and finished well to take the lead. The Academy side started to find their game, but struggled to make any meaningful chances, with the ball firing loosely across goal and causing little threat to the Wallace keeper. Winning the Irish Schools' is the dream of any schoolboy hockey player in Ireland and we feel so privileged to have brought the Tasmanian Shield back to the Academy for the sixth time in the competition's

40 year history. I want to thank my teammates, our head coach Mr Jess and manager Mr Walker for making this possible"

Mr Robin McLoughlin OBE, praised the boys for their resilience after losing the All-Ireland Final last year on runins to come back and win on run-ins demonstrates the fantastic character of the whole squad. He declared this a tremendous achievement and congratulated Matthew and the entire squad, as well as their Coach (Mr Simon Jess) Manager (Mr Colin Walker) and Assistant Coach (Mr John Clarke).

The coaching staff and players of Banbridge Academy would especially like to thank all parents and supporters who made the long trip to Cork to cheer on the team. To celebrate occasions like this with them makes it even more special.






