Banbridge Academy orchestra gives young musicians a chance to experience playing in a group of like-minded individuals and experience a wide range of musical genres such as, pop, classical and more. Pupils join together every Thursday afternoon from 3:30-4:30 to play a selection of music led by Mrs Qua. During 2022 and 2023, we had the opportunity to play at multiple school events.

The first event at which we had the pleasure of performing was our Prize Giving Ceremony in October. We performed Viva la Vida by Coldplay. This was followed by our Christmas performance of traditional Christmas carols with the brass ensemble and choir. We received more praise after our pop-up orchestra appearance in January 2023 during Banbridge Academy Open Night.

Congratulations to Emma Kirkwood on gaining a place in the Ulster Youth Orchestra. The orchestra was founded in 1993 to provide tuition and opportunities for young musicians in Northern Ireland. It is open to musicians of ages 14 to 23 who are grade 7 standard or above. The orchestra does not meet on a weekly

basis for rehearsals but meets up for a 10-day residential course once a year and additional workshops and concerts throughout the year. Members are given the opportunity to work with acclaimed conductors and orchestral musicians. For Emma, the audition process involved learning several excerpts from



the chosen repertoire beforehanda Gershwin Piano Concerto and a Tchaikovsky Piano Concerto, as well as two of her own chosen pieces. She then performed these at Queens University Music Department in front of a panel of Ulster Youth Orchestra tutors.
