Rugby Ist XV B. Leslie

The 2022-23 season will long live in the memory as a historic and successful season for Banbridge Academy 1st XV. The team won the Schools' Bowl, the highest honour we had ever gained and had a hugely successful season as well. The on-pitch pre-season was well attended on the back of a successful first summer program of strength and conditioning held in Banbridge Rugby club's excellent facilities.

Our season began strongly at the Grosvenor Grammar tournament, where we beat the hosts 14-0 and then Rainey Endowed 7-0 but lost out 3-12 to Dromore in the final. The performances here, as much as the results, hinted towards the good season that was to come.

This was followed by a number of friendly games where we tried different combinations of players to see what gelled best. We beat Larne 57-7, Omagh 19-12, lost 5-45 to Enniskillen, beat Lurgan 39-7 and Limavady 20-0 before our first Schools' Cup group game v Dromore High (see later in report). We then beat Regent House 17-12 before our 2nd Cup game v Larne Grammar. This was followed by 3 wins over Friends' School 10-0, Grosvenor Grammar 17-0 and RS Dungannon 31-7 before our final Cup game v Bangor Grammar.

Further friendlies in January, just prior to the Bowl campaign, were a 12-33 loss to Down High and a 24-17 win over RS Dungannon.

Schools' Cup group games

Game 1 v Dromore High:

Unfortunately the team lost 7-19, but it was a fantastic spectacle played in front of a huge crowd of supporters. Dromore went into the tie as heavy favourites as they were the number one seeds in the group, while the Academy were seeded third out of four. The Academy's performance defied this seeming imbalance however and the young team, just 3 Upper 6th boys on the pitch,



more than held their own in a thrilling encounter.

Dromore were first to score with some good phase play resulting in a wellworked score; the extras were added by the kicker. As halftime approached Banbridge piled on the pressure but after a near miss close to the line, Dromore broke away and when Banbridge twice failed to find the safety of touch with clearance kicks, Dromore capitalised and scored again to take a 14-0 lead into halftime.

The 2nd half saw some of the Academy's best rugby with big carries from Ulster Hooker Connor Magee and Ulster back row Ryan Hanna, alongside some



impressive work from 2nd row Noah Bell. This good play led to an outstanding break from centre Luke Charman who burst through the defensive line and then stepped the full-back to score under the posts; Full Back and Captain Ryan Matthews slotted the conversion to bring the score to 7-14. The Academy continued to play well as the game ebbed and flowed both ways, with both teams having chances to increase the score. On 55 minutes it was Dromore who put together an excellent series of phase play and then, as the defence scrambled to cover, they made the midfield break and fed their left wing to score in the corner; the wide-out conversion was missed. As the game drew to a close the Academy continued to try to get within bonus point range but the Dromore defence was resolute and the whistle blew with no change of score.

The game was an epic encounter in many ways; the physicality of both sides was to be commended but the skills levels and work rate from both was also exemplary and the two sets of supporters should also be commended for their loud but sporting support.

Game 2 v Larne Grammar:

Despite a strong start from Larne, the Academy soon kicked into gear and ran out 55-5 winners. The tries came from: Ryan Matthews, Connor Magee, Darragh Knox x 2, Fergus Alway x2, Ryan Hanna, Jacques MacAuley & Noah Bell

and captain Ryam Matthews added five conversions.

Game 3 v Bangor Grammar:

The team completed the group stages of this year's Danske Bank Schools' Cup with an impressive 22-0 win. The match began well for the Academy, when after just two minutes a cross-field kick from outhalf Andrew Jackson resulted in a spill from the Bangor winger and centre Daniel Hutchinson pounced on the loose ball to dive over the line for the opening score. Most of the rest of the half was played in the middle of the pitch, with both teams having their moments but neither able to penetrate resolute defence from each side. With just seconds left before half-time, the Academy executed an excellent righthand move off scrum and winger Noah Myles dived over in the corner for a well worked try. This was converted from wideout by fullback Ryan Matthews, leaving the half-time score 12 - 0 to Banbridge Academy.

The second half began as an evenly contested match with both teams working hard to create opportunities, but neither team were able to capitalise on some good field position. After 20 minutes however, Banbridge Academy executed another nice right-hand scrum move this time moving the width of the pitch and scoring in the corner when flanker Tom King picked up at the base of a ruck and dived over. Just 10 minutes later, with the Academy pressing for the 4th try bonus point, Second Row Noah Bell was the sharpest at a penalty and after a quick tap dived over to secure bonus point and also kill the game as a contest. The Academy were aware that points difference could matter in qualifying out of the group and continued to press for the remaining 10 minutes, but Bangor held firm and there was no further score.

It was a very pleasing display from the Banbridge Academy 1st XV, as away wins are always a rare commodity in the Schools' Cup and a large crowd of travelling supporters thoroughly enjoyed their day out in Bangor.

Schools' Bowl games

Round 1 v Larne Grammar

Our first round tie was a rematch of the Cup group game and it brought about a similar result. Larne were once again very brave and tackled hard all day, but the Academy team had too much power and accuracy and ran out 54-0 winners. The scores came from Jonathan McCrum, Callum Little, Ryan Matthews, Daniel Hutchinson x 2, Elijah Dempsey, Ryan Hanna, Connor Magee and Andrew Jackson with 7 conversions.

when Prop Jonathan McCrum drove over the line to score but Jackson was wide with this conversion attempt. Just before halftime however Omagh pressurised the Academy line and, in spite of some great defence from the Academy, they scrambled over the line for the try and again slotted the kick to take the halftime score to 15-14 in favour of Banbridge.



Round 2 v Bangor Grammar

This was another replay of a group game, but this match was very different. It was a game where the team never really got going and Bangor were immense throughout. It took a very late score from substitute winger Elijah Dempsey to finally get the Academy ahead and they held on to win, 15-14. Connor Magee had earlier scored our other try and Andrew Jackson was on target with the conversion and a penalty.

Semi-final v Omagh Academy

Banbridge Academy 1st XV have booked their place in the Final of the Danske Bank Schools' Bowl with a hard-fought 37-21 win over Omagh Academy in a pulsating semi-final. Andrew Jackson opened the scoring for the Academy with a penalty after just 3 minutes, but despite further pressure from Banbridge it was Omagh who scored first with a well worked forward based try and successful conversion. This sparked the Academy into life as they responded 5 minutes later when 2nd Row Tom King powered over and Jackson successfully converted. This was followed up 5 minutes later The 2nd half got off to a great start when Scrum-half Harry Wan finished off a brilliant attack from the Academy, but just when it seemed the Banbridge boys would pull away, Omagh mounted a counter attack to score on 50 minutes and when the kick was converted they took a 20-21 lead into the final quarter. But Banbridge had saved their best for last. After a number of strong drives, Hooker Connor Magee powered his way over the line to score and Jackson once again added the extras, then a few minutes later Jackson slotted a longrange penalty to take the game out to 9 points. With time running out Banbridge kicked a penalty into the corner and Prop Jonathan McCrum scored his second of the day from the resulting powerful driving maul to seal the 37-21 victory.

Final v Friends' School

Banbridge Academy 1st XV achieved their own little bit of history on, Wed 8th March by winning the Schools Bowl for the first time. The Academy overcame Friends' School, Lisburn 31-15 to claim the Ulster title on a cold but dry day at a blustery Barban Hill, home of Dromore Rugby Club. A huge crowd, in excess



of 1000 people, watched a pulsating game and saw Academy Captain Ryan Matthews hoist the trophy with his team. The Bowl is the top trophy fought for by the 20 schools who did not make it out of the Schools' Cup Group stages.

The final began with the Academy benefitting from a strong wind. They utilised this advantage early on with a good kick to the corner and the Academy lineout functioned well and Prop Jonny McCrum touched down from the resulting driving maul for a 5-0 lead after only 2 minutes. Out half Andrew Jackson was just wide with the conversion. Friends' came into the game after that, but neither team could exert a stranglehold and it wasn't until the 25th minute when Banbridge ran an excellent set piece move of the scrum, that winger Noah Myles powered over in the corner for the score. Jackson slotted this kick to take the score out to 12-0. Friends' followed up with some late 1st half pressure but the Academy defence was resolute and refused to be broken. Friends' eventually settled for a penalty on the stroke of halftime to leave the score 12-3 in the Academy's favour, but with the wind in their faces in the second half it was far from a winning lead.

The Academy came out firing however, and the next 15 minutes were decisive in the tie. After 45 minutes a good phase of attacking play led to 2nd Row Tom King touching down for the important





score for the Academy. Jackson was narrowly wide again. Friends' rallied and moved down field and took advantage of some loose Academy play to score an unconverted try but the Academy boys responded almost immediately, when they powered up-field and produced two brilliant tries in just 3 minutes. First up Prop Thomas Williamson cut a lovely angle to drive over for a score which Jackson converted and then the best score of the game where the Academy moved ball left and right and eventually a sublime one-handed pass from Jackson and a lovely line from Full Back and Captain Ryan Matthews put him in under the posts for the decisive try. Jackson again added the extras to take the score out to 31-8. To Friends' credit they finished the game strongly and got another converted score with just 10 minutes to play but the Academy saw the rest of the game out comfortably and claimed the hard won title of Danske Bank Ulster Schools' Bowl winners.

The Bowl was presented pitchside at the end, on behalf of the Ulster Branch, by Mr Sam Grattan and the large Academy crowd enjoyed the moment. Well done to all involved, a very special day indeed for Banbridge Academy.

Thanks must go to Dromore Rugby Club and Dromore High for the use of their excellent facilities and to their staff for running the event.

The Forwards

The forward pack was the backbone of the team. Loosehead prop was L6 Johnny McCrum who continues to improve with every game he plays. Jonny is a strong scrummager and good ball carrier, who had an eye for the tryline. At Tighthead prop was Thomas Williamson. Thomas was highly effective over the ball in defence and also improved his ball carrying throughout the season and was awarded the Most Improved Player award at the end of the year. At Hooker was Ulster Schools' player L6 Connor Magee. Connor has an excellent lineout throwing and is an extremely strong carrier and big tackling front row player who played for the Ulster clubs and schools team and trained with the Ulster elite training group. He was awarded Player of the Year at the End of Season dinner. Yr 12 Adam Jones also made a number of appearances at prop. Adam is improving all the time and is developing into a really good ball carrier and technical scrummager. In the second row was Yr 12 player Noah Bell who went from strength to strength as the season progressed. He represented Ulster U17 and pushed his way onto the elite training panel. The other second row was L6 Jack Shaw, who was a fast developing forward who enjoys carrying the ball and always gives 100% on the

pitch. In the back row at number eight was Yr 12 Ryan Hanna, who is explosive off the base of the scrum and a very effective ball carrier. At open side Flanker was U6 Tom King who was an excellent lineout forward and strong with ball in hand. Our Blindside flanker was Callum Little, who worked hard around the pitch and was an explosive ball carrier. Flanker Adam Logan forced his way into the team at the end of the season with outstanding performances for both the 2nd XV and 1st XVs and broke into the starting team for the Cup run. Adam is a workhorse flanker who runs and tackles for the full 70 minutes. U6 Henry Knox also played numerous games at flanker and was always industrious and hardworking in both defence and attack.

The Backs

Scrum-half is L6 Fergus Alway. Fergus has a strong pass off both hands and is an excellent decision maker at half back. L6 Harry Wan also played a number of times. Harry is a talented player who is happy playing either 9 or 10 and always does a great job whenever needed. He was awarded the Clubman of the Year award. At Outhalf yr 12 Andrew Jackson slotted seamlessly into the team. He is very effective at running his back line and has an eye for a gap himself, allied with a very strong kicking game. At first Centre was L6 Daniel Hutchinson; Daniel is equally at home at outhalf and is a superb ball player who runs great lines of 10. Outside centre was L6 Luke Charman who is a hard running and big hitting player but also has a subtle side to his ever improving game. On one wing was U6 Noah Myles who possessed incredible pace and strength and was an attacking threat from all areas of the field. On the

other wing was L6 Darragh Knox, whose excellent footwork was always a threat to opposition defence. At fullback was Captain U6 Ryan Matthews. Ryan has an excellent kicking game and was also rock solid under the highball, as well as being very keen to turn defence into attack. He led the team excellently throughout the season and was a first-rate captain. U6 Ronan Quinn would have been a regular starter for the team but unfortunately a bad injury early in the season put him out for the year, but his footwork and defensive capabilities were greatly missed. L6 Jacques Macauley played a number of games at centre or wing and his pace and eye for a gap were always a worry for opposition defences. Yr 12 Elijah Dempsey could also play in wing or centre and he too has pace to burn and came up with some crucial scores as the season progressed.

In addition to those detailed earlier, the following players also represented the 1st XV during the season: James Seifert, Thomas Humphries, Ollie Kelly, Will Kennedy, Corey Hamilton, Benjamin Quigley, Joey Mackrell & Nazie James Mulligan.

The replay at home was a little less nervy with the home side coming out on top 29-7, with tries from Arturs Jonuss, Warren Hooke, Sam Leslie, Noah Haughey and Miles Mawson. The Semi-Final was against Grosvenor GS at home. Having played each other earlier on in the season, it was the Academy side who came out on top 10-3, so both teams were expecting another tight game. Grosvenor took an early 5-0 lead but were then blown away by a superb all-round performance, 41-5. Tries were scored by Miles Mawson (2), Nathan Young, Matthew Morrison, Arturs Jonuss, Sam Leslie and Alex Andersson.

The final against Enniskillen RGS, played at the superb facilities at RS Armagh, did not disappoint the vast number of supporters from both schools. It was the Academy team who started the stronger. Further carries from a number of forwards left an easy job for scrum half Jonny Neill to touch down from a few metres out, leaving the score 5-0 to the Academy. With Enniskillen RGS on the back foot once more, a second score looked inevitable. Superb defending from ERGS left the Academy forwards frustrated and the score remained 5-0. Having weathered the early storm, it was the turn of the Enniskillen side to show their attacking prowess, with their fullback scoring out wide and their impressive inside centre nailing the tricky conversion. The halftime score was 7-5 in favour of ERGS. Both sides knew that the next score would be crucial. Having lost replacement scrumhalf Max Ireland to injury early in the second half, the Academy side had to make further changes which disrupted the flow of the game. The ERGS number 8 then showed his pace out wide to outstrip the cover defence and score in the corner. With the conversion missed, the Academy side trailed 12-5. A superb turnover by replacement winger Adrian Logins, left the Academy team with a line out 5 metres out. Strong carries from Noah Haughey, Caleb Cromie and Fynn Niblock ensured that second row Matthew Morrison had the space for the all-important score. With no



recognised kicker on the pitch, flanker Miles Mawson stepped up to send the conversion straight between the posts from a difficult angle, tying the score 12-12. With little under 10 minutes left to play, both sides looked for that all important score that would seal the victory outright. ERGS had a difficult kick to win it at the death, but the effort drifted wide leaving both sides to share the Trophy.

Having played 17 games and only losing 6, the Medallion squad narrowly missed out on the Team of the Year Award at the rugby end of season dinner. Other winners included: Captain - Noah Haughey, Player of the Year - Fynn Niblock, Most Improved Player - Jonny Neill, Top Try Scorer - Arturs Jonuss (11), Top Points Scorer - Max Ireland (71).

Many of this squad will return next year to fight for a place on the 1st XV, with the eight Year 10 players getting their chance in the Medallion squad once again.
