The 2023-24 season will long be remembered as one of the best in the history of 1st XV rugby at Banbridge Academy. It was a season where the team went undefeated right up until the Schools' Cup quarter final loss to RBAI. Along the way we had some fantastic wins and put in some epic performances, not least in the Schools' Cup group games and last 16 tie against Portadown College.

Pre-season began in mid-July with Athletic Development sessions at Banbridge Rugby club under the watchful eye of our S & C coach Marcus Graham. The on-pitch sessions started in mid-August and the players really bought in with great turn-outs and lots of hard work and commitment. Our season began strongly at the Grosvenor Grammar tournament, where we beat Antrim Grammar 21-0, Rainey Endowed 5-0 and then the hosts Grosvenor Grammar 14-0 to win the Ian Graham Cup.

This was followed by a number of friendly games, where we experimented with different combinations of players to find the best blend. We beat Portadown College 33-7, Larne 26-14, Omagh 27-12, Enniskillen 21-7 and Limavady 55-7 before our first Schools' Cup group game v Carrick Grammar. (See below for Cup reports). In further friendlies we then beat Regent House 31-14 and Belfast High 45-7 before our 2nd Cup game v Ballyclare High. This was followed by a win over Grosvenor Grammar 50-14 before our final Cup game v Limavady Grammar. Further friendlies in January, just

prior to the Cup knockout campaign, saw a 19-12 last minute win over Down High, and a 12-7 win over RS Dungannon.

Schools' Cup Group Games

Our three Schools' Cup group games started brilliantly with a comprehensive win away to Carrick Grammar (40-0) and this was followed by a really good win (21-0) against Ballyclare High School at home. Ballyclare are always a strong side and it took some real determination and persistence to wear them down. Game 3 was a winner-takes-all battle, where we defeated Limavady Grammar 36-7 to qualify for the last 16 of the Schools' Cup. The five try win meant a try bonus for the Academy and as a result we topped Group E of the Schools' Cup.

Going into the game the Academy and Limavady were tied on 9 points, so this was a group decider and was always going to be a tight affair. The 36-9 victory was hard won however, as Limavady got out to an early lead and it took 30 minutes for the Academy to fight their way into the game and then press home their advantage in the 2nd half to take the win. Tries from Noah Bell x 2, Luke Charman, Noah Haughey and Darrah Knox alongside 4 conversions and a penalty from Andrew Jackson accounted for the 36 points.

Schools' Cup last -16 v Portadown College Portadown College were our opponents in the last 16 of the Schools' Cup. The side put in an outstanding performance to record a 40-0 win and advance to the

quarter finals for the first time in 12 years. On a pleasant, but breezy morning, the Academy played the first half with the light wind at their back. Portadown had the better of the early exchanges, but the Banbridge defence dealt comfortably with whatever was thrown at them. 18 minutes into the game, some sustained pressure from the powerful Banbridge forward pack led to a great attacking opportunity and the ball was moved quickly to the left wing where Darragh Knox scored an excellent try. Outhalf Andrew Jackson was just wide with the difficult conversion. Shortly after 24 minutes, Irish Schools' Hooker Connor Magee powered over in the corner to score a fine try. Jackson was successful with this difficult conversion. On 32 minutes, Connor Magee scored the second of his tries when he executed an excellent line break and again crossed the line, this time under the posts, to score. Jackson was once again successful with the conversion. Just minutes later, Magee completed his hat-trick when he made a midfield break and showed excellent pace to outstrip the cover and score under the posts; Jackson again made the conversion as the Referee blew for halftime. With the score of 26-0 at halftime, the Academy were in a commanding position and knew that a strong start to the second half would go a long way to sealing the victory. Five minutes into the second half, Banbridge ran an excellent attacking play off a scrum and scrum-half, Fergus Alway, ran around the cover and beat the last defender to score under the posts; a fantastic individual effort! Jackson once again slotted the extras to take the score to 33-0.





10 minutes later, Captain Daniel Hutchinson eluded the defence and powered over to score and Jackson once again converted. On 55 minutes, Connor Magee scored his fourth try, a remarkable feat in any game, never mind in a Schools' Cup last 16 game. A powerful maul from the Academy drove over the College line and Magee dotted down for the score. Jackson was just wide with this conversion attempt. The final score of the game came in the 65th minute when substitute Nazie Mulligan completed an excellent back play by rounding his winger and scoring in the corner. The conversion attempt was just wide.

Schools' Cup ¼ final v RBAI

Banbridge Academy 1st XV bowed out of the Schools' Cup in an exciting match against the holders, and eventual repeat winners, Royal Belfast Academical Institution. A huge crowd gathered for the important game and it was a wonderful occasion and event for the whole school community. The Academy started the game very strongly and an early penalty attempt went wide, but on 5 minutes another RBAI infraction lead to Andrew Jackson kicking a penalty to take a 3-0 lead. RBAI however came back strongly and scored tries on ten, fifteen and twenty-two minutes but Banbridge rallied at the end of the half however, despite significant pressure, they were unable to score. The 2nd half started as the first ended with Banbridge throwing their all at RBAI, but again there was no reward and RBAI took advantage of some uncharacteristic mistakes to score three more tries to take the game away from the Academy. Banbridge never stopped fighting though and after another period of pressure, Hooker Connor Magee scored off the back of an impressive maul from the superb Banbridge forwards. Andrew Jackson slotted the conversion. The game finished however with another RBAI score, to leave the final score 10-43 to the Belfast school. While it was a disappointing end to the season for the Academy, they can be very proud of their efforts on the day. Unfortunately, the intensity of the game led to too many errors and RBAI are too good of a team to be given

such opportunities.

The Forwards

Loosehead prop was Jonathan McCrum, who has matured into an excellent rugby player and a strong ball carrier. At Tighthead prop was Thomas Williamson. Thomas is very mobile for a prop and his high workrate was always an added bonus to his strong scrummaging and effective ball carrying. Yr 13 Adam Jones also made a number of appearances at prop. Adam is a strong carrier and is sure to be a fundamental part of future teams. Alex Andersson, Yr 12, also featured for the 1st XV at prop and he is another dynamic player who loves to carry and get involved. At Hooker was Connor Magee. Connor gained Irish Schools' U18 recognition throughout the season, playing in several tournaments and cemented himself as the No 1 U18 hooker in Ireland. He was also in the Ulster Schools' U18 squad that competed well in the Interpro series in August and September and his performances have been so good that he was included in the IRFU National Talent squad for 23/24. Callum Little was a starting player either at Hooker or in the back row, but an unfortunate knee injury in November kept him sidelined until mid-January. Callum is a power-house of a ball carrier and one of the biggest tacklers in the team. In the second row was Yr 13 player Noah Bell, who went from strength to strength as the season progressed. Noah was selected for the Irish U18 Clubs & Schools' team and at half term he participated in a camp in Dublin and then flew to Italy to play a test match, where gained his first cap. Noah had previously Captained the Ulster U18 Clubs & Schools' side during the interpros. Jack Shaw was the other 2nd row and he had a brilliant season, combining strong ball carrying with workrate at the breakdown. Fynn Niblock, Yr 12, also played regularly and he is a high energy forward and good at the lineout. Fynn was selected for the Ulster Schools' U17 team against the NSW Raptors. In the back row at number eight was Yr 13 Ryan Hanna. Ryan is an excellent rugby player and he played the full interpro series for Ulster Clubs & Schools' U18 and he had a strong series and has been included

in the U19 training panel for next year. At open side Flanker was Adam Logan who was dynamic on the ball and worked tirelessly in defence. He was awarded the Clubman of the Year Award for his commitment to training and workrate. Our Blindside flanker was Thomas Humphries, who worked hard around the pitch and was an excellent ball carrier and high workrate tackler. Thomas won the Most Improved Player Award for the season. Flanker Noah Haughey, Yr 12, also played many of the 1st XV games and he is a brilliant all-round player who has broken into the Ulster set-up and played for the Ulster Clubs & Schools' U17 team against the NSW raptors.

The Backs

Scrum-half was Fergus Alway. Fergus has an excellent rugby brain and eye for a gap, and he was duly awarded Player of the Year at the End of Season Rugby Awards Ceremony for what was an outstanding season. At Outhalf was Yr 13 Andrew Jackson, who was the fulcrum of the team. He is an energetic attacker who loves to play running rugby. Andrew was also included in the training squad for the Ulster U18 Clubs & Schools' squad and he is young for the team, so has another year to try to force his way onto the senior panels after some impressive outings for the Ulster U17 squads. Harry Wan was also involved in most 1st XV games as a utility player who is happy playing either 9, 10 or 15 and never failed to impress when he played; a talented player who epitomised the team ethic. At first Centre was Captain Daniel Hutchinson. Dan is a wonderful rugby player who runs silky lines and picks good attacking angles. His strength in defence belies his svelte frame and he was a rock at No 12. Outside centre was Luke Charman, who has pace and power in equal measure. Luke was also a very effective defender and loved to knock the opposition back at the gain line. On one wing was Elijah Dempsey who is another pacey runner with a gliding action, while the other wing was Darragh Knox who loved to jink and dodge and had a good eye for the try line. Darragh was the 1st XV top try scorer for the season. At fullback was Joey



Mackrell who slipped seamlessly from attack to defence and was excellent in both areas. Nazie Mulligan played a number of games on the wing and was always a threat and Arturs Jonuss also played a considerable amount in the centre or on the wing and his strength and pace were huge assets. Arturs was included in the Ulster U16 in-season training program.

In addition to those detailed earlier the following players also represented the 1st XV during the season: Ollie Kelly, Will Kennedy, Benjamin Quigley, Jonny Howard, Miles Mawson, Peter Lewis, Sam Dorman and Joshua Thompson.

Gary Clarke Cup

At the end of the season an U17 squad played in the Gary Clarke Cup hosted by Lurgan RFC, and the team had a wonderful night beating Friends' School, Lurgan College and a Barbarians XV to win the trophy.

The 2023-24 2nd XV season will once again be remembered for the Cup run that almost secured a quarter final spot, just like the class of 2022-23.

The season started with superb away victories against Portadown College (12-47) and Larne GS (10-29). Scrum half Jonny Neill and flanker Miles Mawson scoring five tries between them across the two games. The squad then suffered their first defeat of the season away to Omagh Academy (12-14). Having played most of the rugby this was a game they knew that they should have won. The first home game of the season saw a very strong Enniskillen RGS side record an impressive 10-50 victory with injuries in the senior squad starting to take their toll. Two superb wins followed against Limavady GS (17-0) and Regent House (29-26). Royal Academy proved a step too far with the Belfast school coming out on top 47-19. The Academy did get within a converted score early in the second half but a flurry of late tries saw BRA advance to the quarterfinal. Special mention must go to winger Rio Pinion who scored his first try for the school.

Defeat meant a spot in the quarter-final of the 2nd XV plate and a home tie against Bangor GS. Tries from Adam Jones, Peter Lewis and Alex Andersson saw the Academy progress comfortably to the semi-final 17-0.

The final game of the season saw us battle to the end against a very strong Ballymena Academy side who just had too much fire power to win the semi-final 51-5. The scoreline would suggest a very one sided game but in fact it was anything but. Ballymena took their chances while unfortunately we did not. However replacement hooker Callum Little returned from injury to pick up a well deserved try.

With a 3rd XV being fielded for the first time in a few years, it was great to see so many players getting game time. Special mention must go to captain Harry Wan who was superb week in week out and led the team admirably.

The 2023-24 Medallion squad started the season hoping to emulate the classes of 2021-22 and 2022-23, by winning some silverware and completing a remarkable treble for the school.

The season started with great numbers at training and the boys were ready to give it their all. Expectations were high in September when the side started with three fantastic wins in a row against Portadown College (10-12), RS Armagh (34-12) and Larne GS (51-7). These three games produced 11 different try scorers to show just how the team planned on playing. The squad were then brought crashing back down to earth with back-to-back defeats against Omagh Academy (7-35) and Enniskillen RGS (36-19).

RS Armagh were up again next and although this game wasn't as one sided as the first, the Academy managed to come out on top 28-21 in a closely fought contest. With numbers at training continuing to grow, the entire squad made the trip to Antrim GS to play both an 'A' and 'B' fixture with both sides suffering defeats. The 'A' team narrowly lost 21-7, with the 'B' team coming out on the wrong end of a 35-10 scoreline. The squad then went on another winning spree this time against Friends' School Lisburn (45-12), Regent House (17-24) and Belfast HS (45-12). The Regent game was particularly impressive, with the side having to come from behind several times to secure the win.

Tough games then followed against Ballyclare HS (7-15) and Grosvenor GS (27-5) to leave the squad going into the first round of the



Medallion Shield on the back of two defeats. Antrim GS were the visitors and despite a heroic performance from the home side on the back of several injuries, it was Antrim who came out on top 24-17 with impressive outhalf Sam Leslie keeping us in the game with a hat-trick of tries. The squad then entered the Medallion Trophy and knew that the treble was now a realistic possibility.

Three further friendlies followed with two narrow defeats against RS Dungannon (22-21 and 26-31) and a morale boosting win over Down HS (41-7). The quarter-final of the Trophy saw a tough trip to Ballymoney HS with the team coming away with a hard fought 15-0 win with tries from Sam Leslie, Conor Patton and Syd Moore. Bangor Academy were then the visitors for the semi-final with the home side producing one of their best performances of the season to record a 43-14 win with tries coming

from Sam Leslie (3), Luke Wills, Syd Moore, Conor Patton and Sam Williamson.

Having won the Medallion Bowl in 2021/22 and the Medallion Trophy in 2022/23, the class of 2023/24 completed the '3peat' by retaining the Trophy against a determined Belfast HS side at Friends' School, Lisburn. It was the Academy side who looked certain to score first, only for a loose pass to end up in the hands of the High School centre, who sprinted in under the posts from his own half to leave the score 0-7. The Academy forwards began to carry well through captain Patrick McElroy and second row Conor Patton. After several phases, out half Conor Comiskey fed full back Sam Leslie who sliced through the defence to score a crucial try out wide. Comiskey was unsuccessful with the difficult conversion, leaving the Academy trailing 5-7.

Centre Ethan Houston was beginning to assert his dominance in midfield and was duly rewarded when he bounced off two would-be tacklers to reach out and touch down for the Academy's second try of the afternoon. With another unsuccessful conversion, the game was finely poised at 10-7. With halftime fast approaching both sides knew that the next score would be crucial and luckily it came in the form of a fantastic individual effort from flanker Syd Moore. He spotted a gap in the High School defence and left several defenders in his wake to touch down under the posts. Comiskey added the easy two to leave the halftime score 17-7. The Academy coaching duo of Charlie and Jemma Farrell knew that their side were going to have to work even harder in the second half to have any chance of keeping the resolute High







School side at bay. The second half didn't start too well, with Academy openside Leo O'Neill receiving an unfortunate yellow card. High School now began to assert some dominance, but the Academy defence held firm until O'Neill returned to the fold. With ill-discipline at the breakdown costing both sides territory and possession it was High School who found a way to make it count by crossing for another converted score to make it 17-14. It looked as though they were then going to take the lead when their winger made a fantastic break down the touchline, only for fullback Leslie to make the all-important try saving tackle. This seemed to galvanise the Academy players and supporters and it was indeed Leslie who sliced through the defence once again for the match winning score, with Comiskey adding the extras. With the clock in the red High School responded by scoring their third converted try of the afternoon to leave the final score 24-21. Forwards coach Charlie Farrell was naturally delighted with the result

and performance. "The players have worked incredibly hard all season and deserve this success. Credit to High School who fought right up until the final whistle and didn't make things easy for us. We had to dig deep but once we went 24-14 up with a minute to go, we knew we had it all wrapped up."

The U13 experienced a turbulent season, featuring ecstatic victories, hard fought losses, and some iconic individual performances.

The first fixture of the season was away to the Royal School of Armagh. Both the 'A' and 'B' teams lost their games, with Fergus Lowry having a stellar performance, indicating early that he was a first team player. The squad then went on to play Larne Grammar and Wellington College, suffering a narrow seven-point loss to the latter team. Clounagh JHS were the next team to challenge Banbridge Academy. This was a difficult loss in tough conditions, with many players becoming accustomed to the challenges of 15 aside rugby.

At this stage of the season, the squad struggled with injuries, yet the team's enthusiasm remained strong. Numerous positives were taken from the following run of matches, with Daniel Cairns, Rylee Edwards and Jack Agnew having industrious individual performances. During this period, Patrick Hayes and captain Zach Watson earned a call up to Mr Reaney's U14 team and embraced the step up seamlessly, highlighting their strong skill set and unwavering enthusiasm. The U13 fell short to Limavady Grammar 43-19, featuring one of the best displays of attack all season. The squad went on to win three out of the four subsequent fixtures against Methody College Belfast 'C', Friends' School Lisburn 'B' and Belfast High 'A', winning 13-12, 29-7 and 27-19 respectively.

The team went through a turbulent period, epitomised by the 25-7 loss away to Limavady GS in December. This stage of the season saw the emergence of promising neophytes such as Elijah Myles, Reuben Jones and Noah Bingham to name a few. Arguably the most impressive feat of the year is how comfortably the eight or so new players integrated themselves into the team, becoming key members of the squad by the end of the season.

The next big test was against Friends' School Lisburn and Killicomaine Junior High School, with the team recording two loses. The 19-5 defeat against an impressive Friends' side featured our most courageous and commanding defensive performance all season. The improvement in character



continued over to the subsequent fixtures, with multiple impressive scores being recorded in losses to Down High and RS Dungannon.
