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Headmaster's Report 2024/25



Mr Chairman, Dr Doyle, members of the Board of Governors, Mrs Lockhart MP, The Lord Mayor Alderman Moutray, our former Principal Mr Pollock, partner Primary School Principals, colleagues, parents, ladies and gentlemen and, most importantly, our prize winners, welcome to Prize Day – it is a privilege to present my eleventh Annual Report in Banbridge Academy.

I think we can all agree it is great to be able to gather as a school community in this beautiful building. A special thanks to the Select Vestry and the Rector of Holy Trinity, the Rev Nixon for the warmth of their welcome.

Mr Mathers will outline later the illustrious career of our Guest of Honour. Suffice to say that Philip is a double-Olympiad and a medallist at Paris 24. It is great to see our former students excelling in many walks of life. I ask everyone to give an appropriate Academy welcome back to our Guest of Honour, former student Dr Philip Doyle.

Anyone who knows the Academy well understands the vital role the support staff play in maintaining our special ethos. I thank the office, the technical and support staff for running the school on a daily basis. I record a special word of thanks to my new PA, one of our parents, Mrs Joanne Stewart, for her personal dedication and support.

We continue to remain true to the Academy's central aim - for everyone to be happy at school, known personally and cared for individually. During the construction of our new 3-year Development Plan we consulted extensively to develop our collective vision for the school – Belong | Aspire | Achieve. Our special ethos is due to the quality of relationships across our community, and I thank The Academy Association and their Chair, Mrs Audrey Wilson-Reid, for their unstinting support and dedication to the school.

Today I will only be able to provide a brief outline of the academic year. However, I record my thanks to Mrs Gough, in her final year as the School Magazine co-ordinator, and to her team for compiling another wonderful record of the school year in our School Magazine. I also encourage you to visit the school website and follow us on X or Instagram, to keep up to date with the success of our students. Last year, thanks to the work of Miss McCullough, we also developed our first-ever school video.

At the end of the year, we said farewell to Mr Smyth who joined Down High School. We welcomed several permanent appointments at the start of term - Mrs Dalzell (Geography), Mrs McDonald (Art & Design), Mr Thompson (Mathematics), Dr Henry (Head of Biology) and Mr McAdam (Physics). We welcome them to the Academy and trust they enjoy working in our happy community.

As my colleagues and the community have heard me say repeatedly, high-quality outcomes are secured when leadership is distributed effectively across the school. There were several internal promotions: Mr Walker (Head of Mathematics), Mr McClintock (Year Head), Mr Reaney (Temporary Year Head), Mr Thompson (Temporary Year Head), Mr Magee (Teacher in Charge of Boys' Hockey), Miss Greenlee (Teacher in Charge of the School Magazine) and Miss Wright (Financial Administrator). We were delighted when Mrs Sally Johnston, who recently retired as my PA, was awarded the British Empire Medal (BEM) in the King's New Year Honours list. This much-deserved honour recognises Sally's 27 years of dedicated service, during which time she was the heartbeat of the Academy.

2025 will be remembered as a year when our students achieved spectacular outcomes in the public examinations. At A Level almost 90% of all pupils achieved

3 A* - C grades. Out of the 178 pupils who entered these examinations, 105 achieved a minimum of 3 A* - B grades or better. 51 pupils obtained 3 A grades or better, with 18 pupils obtaining at least 3 A* grades – quite incredible outcomes.

AS Level results were impressive, 83.9% of all entries were A - C grades. These results provide an excellent foundation on which to build for A Level success in 2026.

At GCSE the students attained terrific results, 99% of the students achieved at least 7 A* - C grades, including English and Mathematics - truly amazing results. 72% of all entries resulted in top grades A*/A and when B grades are included, this figure rises to approximately 90% of all entries.

The pupils, parents and teachers of the Academy are to be thoroughly congratulated. These outstanding results in the public examinations ensure that our young people can continue with their chosen career pathways. We wish the Class of 2025 every success in the next stage of their educational journey.

The education of our young people involves a partnership, and I pay tribute to my colleagues in our primary schools who have created the foundation for the success our students enjoy. I also pay tribute to the dedication and commitment of the teaching and non-teaching staff of the Academy; their professional approach has undoubtedly underpinned this success. Likewise, the ongoing support provided by our parents and the wider community is to be praised. I ask the pupils to show a token of appreciation to their parents and my colleagues.

The Academy continues to be at the forefront of Education in Northern Ireland. Many guests visited the school, including the Chief Executive Officer

of the Education Authority (Mr Richard Pengelly), the Permanent Secretary of the Department of Education (Mr Ronnie Armour) and as part of the Learn with the Lords programme, Baroness O'Loan, who talked to the students about the work of the House of Lords and the appointment of our former student to the House of Lords - Baroness, Lady Cash, whom we believe is the first peer from Banbridge Academy. Under the leadership of Miss McClelland, the Bar Mock Trial Team once again excelled and qualified to represent Northern Ireland at the National Final at the Old Bailey in London. The year was rounded off with a wonderful visit for Sixth Form politics students to the House of Commons.

Continuing in the world of leadership, Reece Green after a successful campaign was elected to represent Upper Bann in the UK Youth Parliament. Ellie Crimmins and Hannah Kerr represented the role of China at the British Council's COP29 Schools' Simulation Event at Belfast City Hall. A group of A Level Politics students & members of the SistersIN Programme attended a symposium on the central role of women in the Northern Ireland Peace process. The students met with a number of the panellists including Hilary Clinton, former First Lady and Chancellor of QUB.

The school has still to be informed of the top places in the public examinations, however, we were delighted to be informed this week that Lucy Farrell achieved the highest mark in Northern Ireland in GCSE Home Economics:

Food and Nutrition winning the British Nutrition Foundation Drummond Education Award.

Lucy Hodgen was awarded the prestigious Arkwright Engineering Scholarship, the most esteemed scholarship of its kind in the UK. Lucy's award is externally funded by the Royal Air Force, and as part of this, she now benefits from mentorship by an RAF engineer. Lucy also won the Sentinus Young Innovators Intermediate Competition, a significant accomplishment given the exceptionally high standard of the entries.

Debating continues to flourish in the school and Sienna Scullion won the Ulster Women's Unionist Council - Edgar Graham LLB BL Memorial Public Speaking Competition, held in the Senate Chamber at Stormont. May I suggest, Sienna demonstrated to our MLAs the debating skill and composure that is needed within the House.

Students across the school continued to learn languages and participated in the French exchange trip. Roisin Cumming, won the esteemed Anthea Bell Prize for Young Translators, run by the Queen's College Translation Exchange at the University of Oxford. Roisin's winning entry stood out among nearly 5,000 submissions, impressing judges with her linguistic flair and creative interpretation.

Our mathematicians continue to excel, achieving six Gold Certificates in the UK

Intermediate Maths Challenge and our team secured a superb 2nd place in the Queen's University Maths Competition.

Our students excelled in digital skills, from Year 9 pupils coding arcade games at the Ulster Museum's 'STEAM Studio' to our 'VisionAI' team reaching the final of the PwC App Design Competition.

Our aspiring psychologists gained valuable insights, attending the Clinical Psychology event at Queen's, and we were delighted that Beth Sinton was selected for the Sentinus Summer School, where she analysed real-world data from Ulster University's Millennium Cohort study.

On a day when we celebrate the achievements of our current students, it is also right that we pause to remember those who came before us. I extend a special thanks to Mr Acheson and a team of Sixth Form students. Through their extensive research, we were able to unveil a new World War II remembrance board, ensuring that the Academy alumni who lost their lives in the conflict will not be forgotten.

The wider community continues to support the Academy, we thank the James Kane Foundation for awarding the school a grant, which enabled us to offer bespoke support to disadvantaged students.

Our Shared Education Partnership continues to flourish. Our ASPIRE Ambassadors, working with students

from Abbey Christian Brothers' and Our Lady's Grammar, were welcomed to the Long Gallery at Stormont. This special event, attended by numerous MLAs, celebrated the success of the initiative's first year and the strong, lasting connections built between our three schools.

The Academy's ethos continues to focus on care and concern for others. Students signed up to volunteering activities, including community support, environmental teams, wellbeing champions and anti-bullying ambassadors. The students and my colleagues were also incredibly generous, donating approximately £10,000 to various charities and providing hundreds of shoe boxes for Operation Christmas Child. Of particular note, was a donation to the Mandeville Unit at Craigavon Area Hospital in memory of our much-loved former colleague the late Mrs Julie Robinson. Today we thank Trevor and the Robinson family for donating an annual Prize and a beautiful Rose Bowl, it is very fitting that our former Head Girl, Julie & Trevor's daughter - Ellie Robinson, is the inaugural winner of this A Level Spanish Prize.

We continued to supplement our extensive pastoral curriculum with a range of external speakers and guests, covering many important topics, such as, gambling, alcohol & drugs misuse, online safety and relationship & sexuality education. Students also received crucial training in lifesaving CPR and

Sixth Form participated in an important safe driving campaign. We participated in the Department of Health's, Health & Wellbeing programme - helping students develop healthy growth mind-sets and learn practical tips on looking after their emotional wellbeing. A range of bespoke 'Skills for Life' development days were also arranged to ensure our students develop the skills to become successful confident young adults who can progress and become contributors to society.

Students continued to participate in the vast array of extra-curricular activities and House Competitions on offer, including Sports Day, with Crozier winning the fiercely contested House competition.

Almost 100 students travelled on the annual ski trip to Austria and large numbers continue to participate in the Gold Duke of Edinburgh Award scheme. The History department's biannual trip to Berlin focused on World War II and the Cold War, providing the students with invaluable first-hand learning opportunities. A multitude of departmental and co-curricular trips and activities also took place across the Art, Careers, English, Geography, History, Home Economics, Music, Politics, Religious Studies, Science and Technology departments. These activities and visits nurtured our students' understanding and provided crucial opportunities to develop key life skills.

Our Pathways Careers Fair was a huge success, connecting students from Years 10 to 14 with over 80 exhibitors. This diverse group included 50 businesses, from local traders to multi-nationals, and over 30 universities and colleges from across the UK and Ireland. In Year 8, pupils enjoyed the chance to explore their employability skills as they transition from primary school with 'Step Up'. In Junior School the pupils flexed their entrepreneurial muscles with the '10X Challenge'. Year 9 also took part in STEM workshops provided by Sentinus. In Year 12 we used the 'You're Hired' programme to help pupils understand the job market and produce winning CVs.

Numerous Sixth Form students took part in the flagship Young Enterprise company Programme. Establishing three great companies: Revinyl, BeeBundled and Ashwood. In addition, 12 students achieved great success in the Ulster University Assessment in Enterprise.

During the year we enjoyed a wonderful Carol Service and a magnificent Spring Concert. Due to the ever-increasing demand, we have to seek an additional date to accommodate the numbers who wish to attend the annual concert. I thank our Music Department, under the leadership of Mrs Munton and Mrs Qua for the musical items we will enjoy today.

Cassia Moore, achieved exceptional success, winning both the Vocal Category 1st Prize and the overall

Cordes Prize at the Royal Academy of Music's New Talent Festival. Cassia was also invited to sing with the prestigious Charles Wood Singers, recording for BBC Radio 3 & 4 and Radio Ulster, and performed at the Young Musicians' Prom after winning 3rd place in the NI Young Musician of the Year Competition. Mollie Gibson performed a voice soloist for the New Irish Youth Choir and Rebekah Jackson played the trombone with the New Irish Youth Orchestra. Maggie Parton successfully auditioned for the National Youth Concert Band and her sister Eilida played the principal trumpet with the National Children's concert band in Cambridge. An amazing 48 pupils were offered places in the National Youth Choir of Northern Ireland, equating to 66 Choir offers across the Junior, Girls, Training and Senior Choirs.

Due to time, I will only briefly outline another amazing year of sporting success for the Academy, with many Ulster and Irish titles secured; alongside 35 students receiving either National or International Caps across a wide range of sports.

We hosted a special Olympic Assembly, in recognition of former students who have gone on to compete at the Olympics. Six former students represented their respective sports at the Olympics in Paris 2024 - apparently the most Olympians from any school in Ireland and possibly the world. Having so many Olympians from this great part of the world is a tremendous accolade for both the school and our entire

community. The full list of Olympians from the Academy is now eight: Susie Berry (Eventing) - Paris 2024, Peter Brown (Hockey) - Paris 2024, our Guest of Honour today - Philip Doyle (Rowing) - Tokyo 2020 & Paris 2024 (Bronze Medal Winner), Eugene Magee (Hockey) - Rio 2016, Kyle Marshall (Hockey) - Paris 2024, Jonny McKee (Hockey) - Paris 2024, Mark Tumilty (Hockey Coach) - Paris 2024 and Russell White (Triathlon) - Tokyo 2020.

59 students received full Colours and 89 received half Colours for their exceptional achievements in school-related disciplines. At the Armagh, Banbridge and Craigavon Council (ABC) Awards - following a fantastic sailing season, Adam Green was awarded, for the second consecutive year, the Junior Male of the Year.

Our athletics and cross-country teams had a fantastic year. At the Irish Cross-Country Championships, both Emma Rankin and Emma Stewart achieved 9th place finishes in their respective races. Emma Stewart's talent was further recognised with selection for the Irish U17 team, winning a team gold. Both Emmas were selected to represent Northern Ireland at the Mini London Marathon.

In the NI Archery Schools' Cup, the Team were again crowned overall NI Team Champions and Isaac Smyth won Gold in the U16 Barebow.

The Minor Boys' Badminton Team were crowned Ulster Champions for their

league and went on to represent the school at the All-Ireland finals.

In the world of equestrian, Julianna Nelson won the Premier Individual NI Schools' show jumping competition, Tilley Tumilty was crowned all-Ireland Eventing League Champion. Lily Murphy representing Team Ireland, won the individual and overall British Show Pony Championship. In the demanding four-discipline sport of Tetrathlon, Emma Stewart excelled, winning her class at the Pony Club UK Championships and alongside Harry Purdy securing top 10 finishes at both the Senior Regional Championships in Scotland and the Irish National Championships.

Our multi-award-winning Dance Teams, involving 90 pupils, excelled with their 'Musicals' theme this year. Their dedication paid dividends at the Ulster Fusion Dance Competition, where our Junior, Senior, and Mixed teams, along with our duets and trios, all took home Gold medals - a truly outstanding clean sweep.

Our Boys' Hockey 1st XI Team were crowned All-Ireland Schoolboy Champions for a record-equalling seventh time after a 1-0 victory over Friends' School Lisburn in Dublin. Mr Jess deservedly won the ABC Council Schools' Coach of the Year and Mr Walker (Team Manager) deserves a special mention for his dedication & commitment, as he steps down from his role as master-in-charge of Boys' Hockey. The U14 reached the Ferris Cup

Final and yet again there were numerous representative honours - four Ulster U18 Interprovincial Champions: Josh Osbourne, Harry Taylor, Adam McKee, and team captain, Max Nicholson. They were joined representing Ulster U16 Charlie Taylor, Daniel McKee and Owen Dobson and U13 player Teddie McCandless. Charlie, Daniel, Adam and Max all progressed to the Irish squads.

Girls' Hockey players continue to play at the highest level – Ruby Johnston, Sophie Tate and Katie Leslie were selected to represent Ireland and Ruby Cousins and Annie Emerson represented Ulster U13. Charlotte Betts, Katie Leslie, and Sophie Tate at U16 and Alyssa Somerville and Ruby Johnston at U18 represented the winning Ulster Teams at the Inter-pros. The U12, U13A and B teams were crowned Mid-Ulster League Champions and won the Oxford Hockey Tournament. Massive numbers continue to play hockey on a weekly basis, and it was a very strong season across the teams. The Girls 1st XI made it to the semi-final of the Belfast Telegraph Ulster Schools' Cup and the U14 Girls were runners-up in the Stevenson Cup and quarter-finalists in the Junior Cup.

There was significant individual success in football, with Will Megaw's selection for the NI U14 Performance Academy, and Harry Gough's graduation from the Irish FA National Academy and subsequent international goal for the NI U16.

We celebrated the success of our

Senior B Netball team, who won the Netball NI Schools' Senior Shield. Aimee Trainor was selected for the NI U19 squad, Maisie Nicholl and Talia Tamati were selected for the U15 Regional Development Squad.

We again hosted the Best Rugby Tournament with 250 P6 and P7 pupils from 16 local primary schools taking part. The 1st XV Rugby Team had an outstanding season with their new coach, Mr McClintock. After winning their qualification group, they earned the unique opportunity to play their 'final 16' match at Ravenhill. In some of the worst conditions imaginable, the team was defeated by Sullivan Upper. Entering the Subsidiary Shield, they defeated a strong Enniskillen Royal Grammar School in the quarter-final but were narrowly defeated following another great performance in the semi-final against Methodist College Belfast. The Medallion XV battled their way to the final of the Medallion Trophy, just coming up short in their attempt to win a trophy for the fourth year in a row.

There was outstanding individual success. Andrew Jackson represented the Irish U18 Clubs & Schools on their tour to Italy, and Noah Bell was selected for the Irish U18 Schools' training camp. Both Andrew and Noah also played for the Ulster U19 Team. This success continued at the national level, with Charlie Hamilton competing in the Irish Minor Schools, and our freestyle and medley teams of Sophie Black, Samantha Burns-Atkin, Tara Kennedy, Rebecca Lane and Rose Turley combined to be crowned Irish Senior Schools' Relay Champions. Furthermore, Sophie Black and Samantha Burns-Atkin were also selected for the Ulster development programme.

In table tennis, Curtis Rutten was selected for the Ulster team to play in Scotland, while our U13 Boys' team were crowned Ulster Champions and represented the school at the Irish Championships.

Our Girls' Tennis teams had a strong season, with the Junior Team competing well to reach their Shield Final and the Minor Team securing a shared victory in the Plate.







An Overview: Beginning of Banbridge Academy's Shared Education Journey

Banbridge Academy has recently embarked on its first-ever Shared Education partnership with Abbey Christian Brothers' Grammar School and Our Lady's Grammar School. Over the past few years, a number of pupils have been informally involved in collaborative activities between the three schools through various events. However, this year marked the formal launch of the partnership, beginning with an official launch day held at Abbey Christian Brothers' in Newry. Through a dynamic series of workshops and joint activities, students explored pressing social issues at local, national, and global levels. As they learned about each other's school cultures and shared social responsibilities, the experience fostered mutual respect and inclusive learning. The programme not only encouraged meaningful dialogue, but also helped pupils develop essential skills such as teamwork, digital literacy, and public speaking. The year culminated in a Special Celebration Event at Stormont, where the young people showcased their work in front of the Minister of Education, Mr Paul Givan MLA.

This initiative is part of the ASPIRE (Advancing Shared Partnerships through Inclusive Relationships in Education) Project—a four-year programme led by the Education Authority in partnership with Léargas, Early Years, the National Childhood Network, and the Fermanagh Trust. ASPIRE is dedicated to promoting inclusive, cross-community education across Northern Ireland and the Republic of Ireland.

ASPIRE Shared Education Ambassadors from Banbridge Academy, Abbey Christian Brothers' Grammar School, and Our Lady's Grammar School were welcomed to the Long Gallery at Stormont for a special celebration event, marking the culmination of the first year of a Shared Education initiative.

Following a welcome from Mrs Diane Dodds MLA, the students from each school outlined the many different strands of their project. The Education Minister, Mr Paul Givan MLA, concluded the event and congratulated the students and the schools on their dedication to the project.

The project brought together over 60 pupils from the three schools in a collaborative effort to explore and address social issues at local, national, and global levels. Through a series of workshops and joint activities, pupils developed key skills such as teamwork, digital literacy, and public speaking, while also learning about each other's school cultures and shared social responsibilities.


Celebrating Past Pupil Talent: Beth Snelling and the Dromore Food Map

The trip was a valuable experience for all involved, offering inspiration and guidance as students consider their future pathways in the creative industries.




Charlie Shields Reached Ulster Regional Finals with Eros Lost

Year 9: Trip to Murlough

Murlough National Nature Reserve is a fragile 6000-year-old sand dune system owned by the National Trust and has been managed as Ireland's first Nature Reserve since 1967. It is an excellent area for walking and bird watching due to its spectacular location at the edge of Dundrum Bay and the Mourne Mountains. The dune fields at Murlough are the best and most extensive example of dune heath within Ireland with over 720 species of butterflies and moths, one of which, the Marsh Fritillary butterfly, is of European importance. The site is internationally important for wintering wildfowl and waders. The reserve is also used to graze cows, which roam freely through the dunes, keeping the gorse and grass at bay.

Murlough was a great beach to visit to complete our coastal study. It's four to five miles of golden sand and shingle, and many would say it's one of the most beautiful beaches in Northern Ireland. The tides, thankfully on the day we

visited, were quite far out but they can come right up to the edge of the dunes during high tide, making the passing from the beach to Newcastle almost impossible if you don't want to get your feet wet. Although many of our year group decided 'paddling' was the best course of action to complete our study.

Murlough is a great example of the coastal topic we were doing in geography at the beginning of Year 9. The stones and shingle on the beach were great examples of the erosion that the sea can do, with larger pebbles found at the back of the beach. You can see where the sea carried away some of the sand from that beach via the Long Shore Drift, which we discovered does occur at Murlough Beach. You can also spot (or sometimes trip over) the remains of the wooden groynes left on the beach that have been eroded away by the water, placed there to prevent Long Shore Drift, but which have been mainly unsuccessful.



Tourism Trip to Newcastle




Year 11: Rocky River Trip

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Government and Politics

Over the past academic year, the Politics Department has enjoyed a vibrant and enriching programme of events and activities. With visits to both Stormont and Westminster, meaningful engagement with politicians at local and national levels, and student success in youth politics. Pupils have had opportunities to bring their learning beyond the classroom and into the real-world arena of political life.

A major highlight of the year was the visit of Baroness Nuala O'Loan, as part of the UK Parliament's Learn with the Lords outreach programme. A former Police Ombudsman for Northern Ireland and a crossbench peer in the House of Lords, Baroness O'Loan brought with her a wealth of experience in public service, justice and oversight. Baroness O'Loan provided a candid and insightful account of her work both in Northern Ireland and at Westminster. She spoke on topics such as the role of the House of Lords, the relevance of the House of Lords in the 21st century and the importance of integrity in public life. Her

visit also included a lively Q&A session, where students raised issues ranging from House of Lords reform to proposed legislation including the Assisted Dying Bill.

The department was also immensely proud to see Reese Green elected as the Member of Youth Parliament (MYP) for Upper Bann. After a competitive selection process and an election across the constituency, Reese was chosen to represent the voices of young people on the national stage. In his role, Reese will attend events and debates, including the UK Youth Parliament's annual sitting

in the House of Commons, where he will speak on behalf of young people in Northern Ireland. His campaign focused on mental health provision in schools, educational equity, and youth engagement in politics – all issues that resonated with students.

Closer to home, the Year 13 Government and Politics class had the opportunity to visit Stormont, the seat of the Northern Ireland Assembly. The visit included a guided tour of Parliament Buildings, where pupils learned about the architectural and political history of Stormont, followed by a Q and A with local MLAs.

Students were able to ask questions on a range of topics such as education policy, power-sharing, and the role of MLAs in constituency work. These discussions brought classroom theory to life, allowing pupils to see firsthand how regional politics operates within the unique context of Northern Ireland's devolved institutions.

Perhaps the most memorable event of the year was the department's day trip to London, during which pupils received a guided tour of the Palace of Westminster, exploring the House of Commons, the House of Lords, Westminster Hall and Central Lobby. The tour was not only a fantastic opportunity to appreciate the architecture and history of the UK Parliament, but also a valuable educational experience that brought textbook politics to life.

The group enjoyed a series of engaging discussions with political figures. Pupils met with Carla Lockhart MP, MP for Upper Bann, who shared insights into her role at Westminster, her work on committees and the challenges of constituency representation.

Students then met Lord Nigel Dodds, a member of the House of Lords and former MP for North Belfast. He reflected on the differences between serving in the Commons and the Lords, spoke on the role of scrutiny and debate in the legislative process and answered questions on constitutional issues.

The group also had the opportunity to meet Claire Hanna MP for Belfast South. Ms Hanna spoke about issues relating to social justice, cross-community engagement and the impact of UK-wide legislation on Northern Ireland.

We also completed a walking tour of the main London tourist attractions, visited the Imperial War Museum and amassed 37,000 steps!

As the new academic year begins, the Politics Department remains committed to providing students with direct access to political institutions and real-world experiences. These opportunities not only support academic success but also foster the confidence, critical thinking and civic awareness essential to life beyond school.



Year 9 WWI Recruitment Posters

In the autumn term, Year 9 students stepped into the shoes of wartime propagandists, designing their own World War I recruitment posters as part of their study of WWI. Inspired by original posters from the early 20th century, students explored how imagery and language were used to persuade young men to enlist — and then applied those techniques to their own creations.

From patriotic slogans like, "Your Country Needs YOU" to emotional appeals showing families waiting at home, each poster captured a different aspect of the recruitment message. Some students chose to highlight duty and honour, while others focused on guilt, pride, or camaraderie.

Year 9 Trench Projects


In June, 9H students were challenged to research, design, and build realistic models of WWI trenches, capturing the harsh conditions soldiers faced on the front lines.

Using a mix of cardboard, paper mache, lollipop sticks, paint, and plenty of creativity, each group created trench models complete with duckboards, dugouts, barbed wire, sandbags and even miniature soldiers. The attention to detail was remarkable and beyond the craftsmanship, students demonstrated a strong understanding of the historical context.

Heritage Places Event



In April, Mrs Hoy's 9B History class took part in a half day workshop taken by Heritage Places, a project ran by the National Lottery Heritage Fund.

These workshops ran across schools from the local council area, and involved getting students to think about the term 'Heritage' and what it might mean for different people in different contexts.

The session consisted of three elements:

1. Introduction to Heritage

2. Researching and storyboarding
3. Shooting and editing of the video clips.

Students transformed archival footage into Social Media style videos, making heritage engaging, relatable, and interactive.

In groups of two, students selected a video clip to discuss in a short video lasting between 45 and 60 seconds. The overarching question of the project

was 'What is Heritage?'

The video clips selected were from the NI Screen's Digital Archive, and students used the technology provided by the Heritage Places, including iPads and audio mics, to re-record these clips into a more modern setting.

The students thoroughly enjoyed working together and engaging with this project, and their final pieces turned out great!



Senior History Trip: Berlin 2025

In June 2025, pupils from Years 11 to 13 at Banbridge Academy embarked on an unforgettable trip to Berlin. Over five days and four nights, students explored the rich tapestry of German history—from remnants of the Third Reich to Cold War relics, from the era of unification to the modern day. The trip was both educational and enjoyable... with time for an ice cream (or two)!



Day 1 – Arrive in Berlin – 23rd June

The adventure began bright and early at school, where we boarded a coach to Dublin Airport. After breezing through security, we took a short flight of around 1 hour and 45 minutes, landing in Berlin at 7:35pm local time.

Our accommodation was the welcoming Aletto Hotel, where rooms were shared among groups of five. With hot showers, comfortable beds, and hearty breakfasts, it was the perfect base for our Berlin explorations. After settling in, we got some well-earned rest ahead of a packed itinerary.

Day 2 – Reichstag, Bike Tour, DDR Museum – 24th June

We started the day with a train trip from Zoologischer Garten to the Reichstag, Germany's historic parliament building. An audio-guided tour brought its rich history to life—from its construction

in 1884 to its role in modern German democracy.

Next, we hopped on bikes for an 8km tour across Berlin, passing through all four Cold War sectors. We stopped for lunch in the French sector before continuing past landmarks like the Berlin Wall, Neue Synagoge, and the iconic TV Tower in Alexanderplatz.

On our way to the DDR Museum, we passed statues of Karl Marx and Friedrich Engels—key figures in communist ideology. The museum itself, located on the banks of the River Spree, offered immersive exhibits including a replica East Berlin flat, a prison cell, a DDR car simulator, and uniforms from the Nationale Volksarmee. It was a vivid insight into life in East Germany.

Dinner was at Vapiano, an Italian restaurant where we enjoyed a variety

of pizzas and pastas—fuel for another exciting day ahead.

Day 3 – Sachsenhausen & East Side Gallery – 25th June

We ventured outside Berlin to Brandenburg to visit Sachsenhausen, a former concentration camp. The experience was deeply moving and sobering—a stark reminder of the atrocities of the past and the importance of peace and tolerance today. Walking through the grounds, we saw the prisoners' uniforms, work areas, and the places where countless innocent lives were lost. It was a moment of reflection that will stay with us for years to come.

Back in Berlin, we visited the East Side Gallery, an open-air exhibition of murals painted on remnants of the Berlin Wall. Located near the Uber Eats Stadium, the gallery featured works by artists like Kim Prisu and Jim Avignon. The atmosphere



was lively—especially with a Pitbull concert happening nearby!

We ended the day on a lighter note with a trip to an arcade for bowling and pool and some well-earned fun.

Day 4 – Brandenburg Gate, Stasi Prison & Bunkers – 26th June

Our final full day began with a visit to the Brandenburg Gate, Berlin's answer to the Eiffel Tower or Big Ben, as Mr. Erskine aptly put it. After a quick photo op, we headed to the Berlin-Hohenschönhausen Memorial, a former Nazi prison turned Stasi detention centre. The museum showcased chilling remnants of East Germany's secret police operations—from interrogation rooms to surveillance equipment.

Later, we explored the Alexanderplatz markets, picking up souvenirs and enjoying lunch while listening to buskers—including a Scottish performer named Justin McConville.

In the afternoon, we split into two groups for tours of Cold War and WWII

bunkers. These 90-minute guided tours were incredibly detailed, offering insights into the bunkers' construction, use, and preservation. Though photography was prohibited, the memories will last a lifetime.

We wrapped up the day with a final dinner at Schleusenkrug, just a short walk from our hotel.

Day 5 – Olympics, Zoos & Auf Wiedersehen—27th June

Our final day in Berlin began with a fond farewell to the Aletto Hotel, our home for the past four nights. Bags packed and spirits high, we set off for one of Berlin's most iconic landmarks: the Olympiastadion.

Built for the 1936 Olympic Games, the stadium is steeped in history. We learned about legendary athletes like Jesse Owens, whose triumphs challenged Nazi ideology on a global stage. The tour also explored the stadium's Cold War significance and its role in local football culture, offering a fascinating blend of sport and politics. After a quick stop at

the gift shop, we boarded the train for our final excursion in the German capital. Students were given a choice: a shopping trip or a visit to Berlin Zoo. The majority opted for the zoo—and what a choice it was!

Berlin Zoo boasts an incredible variety of animals, from pandas and penguins to lions, kangaroos, elephants, and even capybaras. With roughly 90 minutes to explore, we raced to see as many creatures as possible, including an entire section dedicated to primates and apes. It was a vibrant and joyful experience—one that brought smiles to everyone's faces.

To round off our Berlin adventure, we headed to the world-famous Hard Rock Café for our final meal. With great food and even better company, it was the perfect way to celebrate the end of an unforgettable trip.

From there, we made our way to Berlin-Brandenburg Airport, ready to return to Banbridge Academy in the early hours of 28th June—tired but full of memories!

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
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French Exchange

On Thursday we had an opportunity to observe and participate in a number of lessons at the Collège St Joseph. We all agreed that it was fascinating to see the differences between both education systems.



This year over 22,000 students across the UK participated in the competition with several pupils from different year groups in Banbridge Academy getting involved. The entries were judged by professional literary translators and students at the University of Oxford. Roisin Cumming, Year 13, was awarded National Winner across the UK for her translation into English of a text from the Spanish BBVA Group and we congratulate her on this fantastic achievement.

Junior Cooks Club

Food and Drinks Masterclass Young Enterprise



Queen's Research Project Iodine

The Food and Nutrition department worked with researchers from Queen's University Belfast (QUB) who were interested in secondary school children's understanding of iodine and iodine deficiency-related disorders. The EUthyroid2 study aims to improve low awareness of iodine deficiency and iodine-deficiency disorders (IDD) and highlight the importance of iodine nutrition among adolescents. This is important because the human body needs constant small amounts of iodine for metabolism and brain development, but normal diets in most countries do not contain enough iodine, resulting in iodine deficiency, the world's largest cause of preventable mental impairment.




QUB School Engagement

Orchestra is a reflection of the 200+ music lessons which go on inside the Academy, plus lessons taken by instrumentalists outside school. There is a large range of musical skill on show, but many of our 45 members are grade 5 and above. Orchestra is sometimes the only opportunity young instrumentalists get to play in a group. Performance can be a highly satisfying experience, being more than the sum of its parts - the more experienced help the less experienced, and we learn vital music skills of listening, sight reading and communicating as a group, forming relationships across year groups in the process.

This year in the Banbridge Academy Orchestra there were 18 strings, 9 brass, 5 percussion and 14 woodwind instruments in the sections respectively, with instrumentalists from Year 8 to Year 14. The largest group of players were the clarinets who comprise 1/5 of the orchestra! Some recent additions to the orchestral array include Reuben Hill (bass guitar), Lauren Jeffers (double bass), Rory O'Neill (bassoon). Seasoned yet solo instruments which are also part of our orchestra sound include: Maggie Parton (alto saxophone), Eilidh Parton (trumpet) and Samuel Bentley (euphonium). Almac Trip

In December 2024, a group of Year 13 Chemistry students had the exciting opportunity to visit Almac's Craigavon campus. Upon arrival, we were warmly welcomed by the friendly staff who would be guiding us throughout the day.

We were immediately struck by the size of the operation at Almac, and amazed by their future expansion plans, both in Europe and in the United States.

We began with the necessary health and safety briefing, ensuring we were well-prepared before entering the labs. We were given a short presentation about the processes which occurred at Almac, from the many thousands of initial chemical compounds which can be tested for use as medicinal products, these are quickly narrowed down to only a small number of compounds which are safe for human consumption, yet will still meet the medicinal needs. These few compounds are called the active Pharmaceutical Ingredients (API) and billions of pounds are invested in each medicine, before it gets to production and dispensing stages.

We then had some guided tours of the laboratories where future medicines were being prepared and tested, before having the opportunity to hear how the API could then be produced in larger quantities for mass production. This allowed us to consider some essential A Level Chemistry topics about sustainability in Chemistry and yields



of products, as well as considering the health and safety consequences of producing such large quantities of potentially volatile chemicals.

The tours also allowed us to see the range of equipment and processes used, from spectroscopy machines to chromatography machines which cost a lot more than we care to think about. We also had the opportunity to meet some past pupils of Banbridge Academy and it was nice to hear about how they have managed to progress their careers since leaving school.

The refreshing thing about meeting people and having the opportunity to ask questions, was that it showed chemistry and the Pharmaceutical industry has relevance for real people and helped us to see how the chemistry we learn in school is a good foundation for a career in the Pharmaceutical Industry.

We also had the opportunity to experience a typical day in the life of an Almac employee, from computer processing of raw data, to application of some of the chemical processes we see in school everyday, to more complicated reactions that caused my brain to hurt.

We also had the opportunity to hear about Almac's Higher Level Apprenticeship programme, which sounded like a great option for anyone considering a career in chemistry without going down the traditional university route. It involves working in Almac, alongside one or two days a week of university study, which leads to the same outcome as a degree in Chemistry, without all the student debt.

Overall, it was a very enjoyable and informative trip, and we enjoyed the opportunity to see how a local company has such a wide ranging variety of processes occurring, all based on the chemistry we study in school.

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



World War II Commemoration

Mr Acheson

A new board commemorating the former pupils of Banbridge Academy who died during World War II has been erected outside the Assembly Hall in the school, which complements the existing stone memorial situated in front of Edenderry House.

The new board provides more information on each of the veterans detailing their early life, their attendance at Banbridge Academy and their military service. It was the result of many hours of dedicated research by former pupils Aaron Millen, Beth Cordner and Deborah Elliott who assisted in making the project possible. Working alongside Mr Acheson, the pupils researched and wrote profiles on each veteran as well as finding photographs and lots of new and previously unknown information along the way.

The war veterans are:

CAPTAIN WILLIAM LEDLIE (1894-1940)

Captain William Ledlie was born on 16 April 1894 and came from Loughbrickland. He attended Banbridge Academy as a teenager and went on to become an apprentice for the engineering department of the Great Northern Railways, Belfast. However, in response to WWI, in 1916 Ledlie joined the Royal Flying Corps where he quickly attained the rank of Captain. Ledlie survived the First World War and returned home. In the inter-war period, he was involved in flying commercial aircraft in England whilst being part of the RAF reserve.

However in 1939, Ledlie went back to war where he served bravely, most notably



during the evacuation at Dunkirk in France. On 23 October 1940, he was the co-pilot of the De Havilland DH.95 Hertfordshire, no. R2510 aircraft flying to Belfast. The aircraft was carrying five crew and six passengers and shortly after take-off crashed into houses at Woodland Way, Mill Hill, London. All on board, including Ledlie, perished in the crash and he is buried at Loughbrickland Presbyterian Church. Captain William Ledlie was 46 years old when he died.

SERGEANT PILOT JOHN MARTIN (1909-1941)

Sergeant Pilot John D Martin was born on 25 May 1909 at Kilmacrew House, Maghera, Banbridge and was a nephew of the acclaimed writer Helen Waddell, after whom one of the Banbridge Academy Houses is named. He attended Banbridge Academy and went on to study for a BSc in Forestry Engineering in Edinburgh. In 1941, he joined the RAF Volunteer Reserve and qualified as a pilot. Sergeant Pilot John Martin died on 10 November 1941 as a result of injuries sustained in a road

traffic accident and is buried in Athlone Cemetery, Bulawayo in Zimbabwe. He was 32 years old.

Mrs Margaret (Meg) Martin, Sergeant Pilot John Martin's mother, unveiled the Banbridge Academy war memorial when it was originally commissioned.



SERGEANT OBSERVER ROBERT MCCRORY (1918-1942)

Sergeant Observer Robert Getgood McCrory, known as Bob, was born on 4 November 1918. Robert went to Banbridge Public Elementary School and later to Banbridge Academy, where he was Head Boy. After leaving the Academy, McCrory became a teacher

and took on the role as Principal in St John's School, Kilwarlin, Hillsborough, where he remained until 1941, when he decided to join the Royal Air Force Volunteer Reserve. After completing basic training and specialised aircrew training in Canada, McCrory was posted to 115 Squadron as an Observer, which was based in RAF Marham in Norfolk, England. McCrory was the wireless operator and air gunner of a Wellington bomber when it took off from RAF Marham on 28 July 1942 for an air raid on Hamburg in Germany. Sergeant McCrory was pronounced missing or killed in action on 29 July 1942 after the plane had crashed around Kiel, near Hamburg. He is buried in Kiel War Cemetery in Germany. The inscription on his headstone reads 'faithful unto death'. Sergeant Observer Robert McCrory was 23 years old when he was killed.

SERGEANT PILOT GEORGE WALSH (1917-1942)


Sergeant Pilot George Henry Walsh was born in Banbridge on 25 July 1917. Walsh was a former pupil of Lancastrian School and Banbridge Academy. He

enlisted at the beginning of World War II in the Ulster Searchlight Regiment and during his time in the regiment they were evacuated from Dunkirk in 1940. In January 1941, he transferred to

the RAF and, following training in the USA, he was subsequently posted to an aerodrome in England. On 28 December 1942 his Hurricane fighter plane collided with another Hurricane during training over Bristol Hill near Longtown in Cumbria, England and both pilots were killed instantly. Sergeant Pilot George Walsh was 25 years old when he died and is buried in Banbridge Cemetery on the Newry Road. His headstone bears the inscription, "One Of The Few To Whom The Many Owe So Much."

FLYING OFFICER JOSEPH MCKEE (1910 - 1944)

Flying Officer Joseph McKee was born on 20 December 1910 at Emdale, Ballinaskeagh, Rathfriland. McKee was educated at Banbridge Academy, enrolling in 1921. He enlisted into the RAF Volunteer Reserve on 26 October 1941 and after successfully completing



training in England and Canada he was promoted to Pilot Officer on 16 April 1943. He eventually became a crew member of a Lancaster Mark III bomber and between February and May 1944 took part in operational missions over enemy territory. On the night 23 May 1944, McKee took off from RAF Bardney, Lincolnshire to take part in a bombing mission over Germany and was returning to England, after its completion, when he was intercepted by a Luftwaffe fighter and shot down. Flying Officer Joseph McKee was 33 years old when he died and is buried in Reichswald Forest War Cemetery in Germany, close to the Dutch border.

SIGNALLER GERARD MCCREANOR (1912-1944)

Signaller Gerard Francis McCreanor was born on 23 July 1912 in Reilly Street, Banbridge. He

was educated at Banbridge Roman Catholic School and then Banbridge Academy. Following training in England he was posted to India as a Signaller, where he served with the Brigade Signal Section of the 50th Indian Parachute Brigade. The 50th Brigade saw extensive action during the Battle of Sangshak (in India, near the border with Myanmar) 21 to 26 March 1944. The Brigade suffered extremely heavy casualties, totalling 40 officers and 545 other ranks. The exact circumstances of McCreanor's death remain unknown, but he was killed on the very first day of this battle, aged 31. Signaller Gerard McCreanor left his parents, wife Annie Josephine and three

children to mourn his sad loss. He is buried in Imphal War Cemetery, India and his headstone bears the inscription, "Sacred Heart of Jesus, Have Mercy on his Soul. May he Rest in Peace."

During the summer holidays of 2024, Mr Acheson had the opportunity to visit Flying Officer Joseph McKee's grave in Germany and he laid both a poppy cross and one with the Banbridge Academy crest as a simple tribute from the Banbridge Academy community, both past and present, to recognise the sacrifice of Flying Officer McKee during World War II.

Mixed Dance Team



Banbridge Academy's Bar Mock Trial team once again demonstrated their legal flair and teamwork on a national stage, enjoying a year of outstanding success in the prestigious 'Young Citizens Bar Mock Trial Competition'. After winning their virtual heat in January 2025, the team progressed to the UK National Final, held at the Royal Courts of Justice in London on Saturday 22nd March 2025 - an unforgettable experience for all involved.

This year's journey began with the virtual regional heat in January, in which the Banbridge Academy team competed in three rounds against three English schools, Queen Elizabeth High School, St. Thomas More Catholic School and Stantonbury School, via live video link, presenting two criminal law cases before real barristers and judges. The format demanded not only strong advocacy skills but also the ability to work seamlessly as a team under pressure. The Academy rose to the occasion, with each student demonstrating poise, preparation and professionalism far

beyond their training.

The team's success in the virtual heat meant they were one of just 24 schools from across the UK invited to the National Final in London, an exceptional achievement in a competition that attracts hundreds of entrants annually. Representing Northern Ireland at this level was both an honour and a challenge, but one the students embraced with characteristic enthusiasm and determination.

The trip to London was not all work and no play. To celebrate reaching the final, the team enjoyed a well-earned day exploring some of the capital's most famous sights. A walking tour took them past landmarks such as Buckingham Palace, Westminster Abbey, Big Ben, Horse Guards Parade, and Trafalgar Square, giving students a deeper appreciation of the city's history, politics and architecture.

One of the highlights of the trip was a visit to the Sky Garden — a unique



public space, offering panoramic views of London's skyline. Students took in a 360-degree view of the capital while enjoying a well-deserved break from the courtroom drama. An evening walk on the South Bank set us up for the competition the next day.

Stepping into the Royal Courts of Justice, one of the most iconic legal buildings in the UK, was an experience none of the team will forget. The imposing Gothic architecture, formal courtrooms and historic surroundings gave the day a sense of occasion and authenticity that brought their months of preparation vividly to life. Thinking of the many high profile criminal cases that have been tried inside those courtrooms really gave us a sense of occasion.

Throughout the day, the team took part in three rounds of legal proceedings, performing both prosecution and defence roles in criminal cases. Round 1 was against The Rochester Grammar School. In Round 2 we were pitted against the Boswells School and in

Round 3 our opponents were Harrogate Grammar School. Each role in the team, from barristers to witnesses to court clerk, was expertly carried out by Banbridge Academy students, who impressed judges and spectators alike with their clarity of argument, attention to legal detail and confident public speaking.

Although the competition was fierce, the team's hard work and resilience shone through, and their performance earned praise from sitting judges and practising barristers, many of whom remarked on the quality of the advocacy and preparation. While the school didn't return with the overall trophy, simply reaching the National Final and performing with such skill on that stage, marks an exceptional accomplishment. We took some comfort from the fact that we had been up against the ultimate winners in Round 2 and even their teachers acknowledged that it had been a closely contested heat.

Much of the success of this year's team can be attributed to their dedication and

the collaborative spirit that developed during weekly Wednesday practices. Under the guidance of 2 barrister mentors, former Banbridge Academy students Vikki Singer and Severina Kelley, students not only developed advocacy and critical thinking skills but also formed strong bonds of teamwork and friendship.

The Bar Mock Trial competition has always been about more than winning — it's about learning how the justice system works, understanding the importance of fairness and reasoned argument and building the confidence to stand up and be heard. The 2025 team exemplified all these values and more.

As they look back on their time in the competition, from the virtual heat in January to the grandeur of the Royal Courts in March, the students can be incredibly proud of what they achieved. They represented Banbridge Academy with integrity, intelligence and passion and gained a valuable first-hand experience of the operation of the legal system in the UK.

Each week during Engineering Society we had the opportunity to hear from many companies, giving us an understanding of what they do on a daily basis, what it would be like to work for them and what pathways we could take to do so. Alongside this we also had many opportunities to visit, in person, many local engineering companies with connections and opportunities abroad and to hear about work experience opportunities available to us, to assist us in deciding career paths and making connections. Such interactive learning through our trips provides a vital part of our education, as we are encouraged to see how what we are learning in the classroom is used practically each day, in the real world.

We had the pleasure of having many visitors, speaking to us on topics from Higher Level Apprenticeships and local engineering opportunities. Some of our visitors included:

Peter Kerr, a representative from Dawson-WAM (specialist civil engineering and piling contractors) who discussed qualifications, career opportunities, apprenticeships and work

experience available within the sector.

Professor Máire O'Neill (from the faculty of Engineering and Physical Sciences, QUB) who discussed the world of cybersecurity.

Elita Frid, manager of Education and Industry Engagement, who discussed the variety of career opportunities in the engineering sector here in NI and MEGA Degree Apprenticeships in Mechanical and Manufacturing Engineering with Ulster University.

Sophie Graham, a past pupil who now works for Almac as an Analytical Chemist, who discussed her own journey through school, university and employment.

Banbridge Academy Engineering Society made many visits to companies such as Collins Aerospace in Kilkeel, Hyster Yale in Craigavon and Walter Watson in Castlewellan. The visit to Collins Aerospace included a tour of their facilities, seeing the production lines for plane seats and how the fabrication of the seats is completed. The visit finished with a small car building competition. At Hyster Yale, we were able to learn about opportunities within the company and tour the site, seeing the testing area and the production line for forklifts, including electric forklifts. On our trip to Walter

Watson, we were given a tour of both the painting and production sites, along with seeing their rebar (reinforcement bar) and crane area as well as being shown plans by civil engineers on the software they use. Such visits provided us with a view of both the design and manufacturing processes that take place within industry.

In conclusion, the Engineering Society has provided invaluable insights for students in Years 11-14 to learn more about the vast world of engineering. Through weekly talks from engineering companies, hands-on visits and a glance into career and academic pathways, we've all gained a clearer picture of the many sectors and opportunities within engineering. These experiences have not only broadened our knowledge, but also helped many of us begin to consider our futures within engineering. The society continues to be a vital part of introducing and educating students about the world of engineering. We look forward to seeing it inspire many more students in the years to come.



We finished the season winning 12/19 matches, scoring 63 tries and 416 points. The Ulster Schools' Cup groups were drawn and the Banbridge Academy team were drawn away to RS Dungannon, Omagh Academy and at home to Dalriada. In the run up to the first Schools' Cup group match

against RS Dungannon, the team were able to build on their wins against Larne GS and Omagh Academy. Losses against Enniskillen GS and Down HS were disappointing, but they were good preparation for the tough group matches ahead.

RS Dungannon is never an easy place to go to and the stakes for this one were particularly high with it being the first group game and the school where the new coach, Mr McClintock, had coached for the previous 11 years. An early try from captain Ryan Hanna settled the Academy team. RS Dungannon responded with a penalty, but a try from

Noah Bell, converted by Andrew Jackson meant Banbridge were in control with a 3-12 lead at half time. RS Dungannon didn't give up and clawed back an early second half try to close the scoreline to 10-12. Pressure was mounting and the Banbridge team suffered another blow when they were reduced to 14 players and RS Dungannon took the lead for the first time, with an unconverted try to make the score 15-12. It was at this point we saw the true fight from the Banbridge Academy players, as they pulled together to empty the tanks. Strong carries from key players, such as Arturs Jonuss and Noah Bell, got Banbridge on the front foot, which eventually resulted in Miles Mawson touching down for 5 points, sealing the 15-17 win for Banbridge Academy.

A well-earned half-term break meant there were no friendly matches before the next group stage match against Dalriada. Dalriada had recorded some impressive scores up to this point, so the team knew this result would be important in deciding who would make it into the knock-out stages. I don't think the supporters and coaches could take another nail-biting match so soon after the first group game, so it was a relief that the Banbridge side controlled the Dalriada match throughout. It was a mature performance from the team and an insight into what this team was capable of. Tries from Noah Bell and Sam Leslie, with a conversion by Andrew Jackson secured the 12-0 win and one more win up in Omagh would guarantee a spot in the knock-out stages of the Ulster Schools' Cup. Further convincing wins against Grosvenor GS and Belfast HS were recorded before travelling to Omagh Academy just before the Christmas break. Omagh Academy is another school that can prove to be difficult opposition, but the players were confident in their approach and the 3-28 win never looked in doubt. Andrew Jackson converted the tries from Arturs Jonuss, Ethan Houston, Jonny Howard and Ryan Hanna, with Noah Bell recording another Player of the Match performance. This meant qualification to the last 16 of the Ulster Schools' Cup was guaranteed, finishing top of the group.



RUGBY

The draw took place and we were drawn at home against Sullivan Upper, a seeded team with a strong Schools' Cup record. Ulster Rugby chose this fixture for a unique opportunity to play at the Kingspan Stadium. This would mean sacrificing the home draw, but the team all agreed this opportunity was too good to turn down. The excitement continued to build and it was exciting to see so many pupils, family members, friends and teachers purchase tickets to come along and support the Banbridge Academy team. Unfortunately, the weather produced some of the worst conditions imaginable at the home of Ulster Rugby, which made it very difficult for both teams to play the rugby they had planned. However, it didn't drown out the atmosphere and both teams were complimented on their level of skill and the exciting style of rugby played. A couple of missed opportunities by Banbridge Academy allowed Sullivan Upper to keep the score board ticking over in their favour and they secured their place in the quarter final of the Ulster Schools' Cup, which meant we now entered the quarter final of the Ulster Schools' Subsidiary Shield, along with some top seed teams such as, Campbell College and Methodist College.

A home draw against Enniskillen RGS was the next big challenge for the squad, which was not going to be easy after losing 38-14 earlier in the season. This turned out to be an enthralling match with two sides, who desperately wanted to keep their season alive. Noah Haughey squeezed over the line with a well worked try, which was converted by Andrew Jackson. However, Enniskillen managed to control the scoreboard for most of the match with a 7-10 lead. That 'never give up' attitude that we had seen on so many of the big occasions this season was evident again. In the end it was a well-worked combination of phase plays straight off the training field, finished off by Peter Lewis, that sealed the semi-final spot for Banbridge Academy in the last play of the match. Players, coaches and supporters were all ecstatic in their celebrations, with the 14-10 victory. A home draw against MCB was the next big challenge and one that the coaches and players were excited about.

With plenty of home support behind us, the 1st XV took an early 5-0 after a clever cross field kick from Andrew Jackson was



caught by Ethan Houston as he dived over the line. MCB responded with a try at the other end to equalise. Further pressure from the visiting side meant they took a 10-5 lead, but we didn't drop the heads and sustained pressure allowed Miles Mawson over and the conversion from Andrew Jackson gave control back to Banbridge. A break-away try for MCB meant they took control of the lead again. Yet again the team gave everything to close the gap and regain the lead, but unfortunately the try from Noah Haughey, converted by Andrew Jackson, was the final play of the game and MCB sealed their 29-19 win and a place in the final against Campbell College.

It is great to see Banbridge Academy 1st XV continuing to compete with some of the so called 'big rugby schools' and I am excited at the prospects ahead with many of this season's squad returning to play Schools' Cup rugby next season with plenty of experience under their belts.

It was great to have a 3rd XV team again this year, which allowed players who were fighting for spots on the 2nd XV to perform and keep getting game time.


At the end of season award ceremony, Matthew Christie was awarded player of the year and Jack Lewis was awarded most improved player.


Meanwhile, at the Mini, Minor and Junior District School Championships, Harmony


